THE COUNCIL.

It may be that we will get our City
Council for 1920 along with the us-
ual crop of New Year resolutions.
There is only another day left of
1919; and yet there is no one out for
a seat on the Council. It would be
a mistake to assume that the reason
for this is that the present Council
has given entire satisfaction during
its year in office. No ruling body
ever existed on this earth that suc-
ceeded in satisfying everybody. The
present Council on the whole has
gone along very harmoniously, and
may be credited with the honest in-
tention of serving the city to the best
of their ability. Mistakes, of course,
they have made, and there is the con-

sideration that next year the Council
will have to deal with large improve-
ment questions. For this reason it
is imperative that the coming election
should receive greater and more gen-
eral attention that it seems to have
done yet. As a rule there is little
doing around the holidays, but on
the other hand there is very little
time to spare. Even if the present
Council is to go back on bloc, it
would be the better for knowing that
the citizens generally were really in-
terested in the fact. It would do the
Council good to know that the citi-
zens were behind them, were satis-
fied with their administration of the
city's affairs in 1919, and content to
leave it to them for 1920.

CORONER'S COCKTAILS.

The United States is really a mar-
vellous country. Its governing bod-
ies have refused to ratify the peace
treaty as it stands. This would not
have been so surprising had the Uni-
ted States delegates at the Peace
Conference had a full share in mak-
ing and framing it. In fact more
than any other great leader at the
Conference it was President Wilson
that the Senate turned down, and the
whole thing is probably attributable
to party politics. Some of the Sena-
tors will have no interference with
European politics nor will they suf-
fer America to be drawn into Euro-
pean affairs. It is nothing to them
that a year ago over two million of
the picked manhood of the country
was in France, that thousands of
young Americans left their bones
there, and that the adventure cost
millions of dollars. It was really to
prevent the recurrence of such con-
ditions as forced America into war
that President Wilson insisted on
the League of Nations pact being
made apart of the peace treaty. Yet
the Senate left the whole question in
the air and the United States has
yet to make peace with Germany.

And during the war, in which the
logic of some of the United States
Senators would deny America a part,
an experiment in "bone dryness"
was initiated. The experiment has
several peculiar features. America
has long been sung as the Land of the
Free. Theoretically, the claim cannot
be disputed; but in a free democ-
racy the people's will should be
sovereign. In this experiment the
people's will was very little consid-
ered. The law, through the Ameri-
can Houses of Representatives, de-
clared the country "dry," and dry it
has to be. One result has been that
the holidays have produced a crop
of alcoholic poisonings. Amateur
distillers have produced a beverage
which somebody has dubbed "Coro-
ner's Cocktail." At all events the
Coroner has been in great demand
in many cities and it is quite evi-
dent that bootlegging has been exten-
sively carried on. This is the surpris-
ing thing in a country which is "bone
dry" by law.

"Now, it is easy to criticize and
when one offers criticism he should
be prepared also to offer a remedy,"
Sir George continued. "My sugges-
tion is that Canadian manufacturers
should, without a day's delay send
representatives to Japan and China
to study the markets and secure or-
ders. They should prepare to put in
departments for the manufacture of
goods suitable to those markets.
They should be prepared to meet the
wishes of the Oriental consumer,
even if it is a little trouble.

San Francisco and even on Canadian
letters of credit, Japanese banks re-
mit through San Francisco.

"The Canadian government should
provide better facilities for our rep-
resentatives housing them in good
offices where effective displays of
Canadian products could be made.
Our men should be adequately paid,
and given a better support in develop-
ing interest in Canadian goods.

"If Canadian manufacturers do
not wake up to the national impor-
tance of developing Canadian foreign
trade, then perhaps a little tariff leg-
islation might be suggested as a
means of enlightening them. You
know the theory of the protective
market is that it preserves the home
market and thus enables the manu-
facturer to compete in the foreign
market but apparently too many Cana-
dian manufacturers are content to
enjoy the easy fruits of a protected
home market and let the foreign
trade go by default. Such an atti-
tude can result only in the very con-
dition which Sir John A. Macdonald,
Sir Charles Tupper, and other early
statesmen claimed the protective
tariff would deliver us from, 'a na-
tion of hewers of wood and drawers
of water.'

"Again I ask that Canada wake
up, and take heed whether we are
drifting. Let us forget for awhile
the petty quarrels and issues with
the public mind, and the press to
a large extent, seems to be dis-
tracted, and devote our energies to
the big worthwhile welfare of the
country. Canada needs today the co-
operation of the brains and brawn of
her workers and the counsel of level-
headed men if we are to avoid the
penalties of a long-continued adverse
trade balance. We must not only
produce more, but we must export
many times as much as we are now
exporting, and we must import few-
er luxuries. In brief, Canada must
get down to a sane basis of living,
and an honest day's work for honest
pay.

"Our wonderful national resour-
ces will be only a mockery to us
unless we utilize them for our own
advantage. The world needs the
products of our soil, our forests,
mines and waters, and we, as the
custodians of these great resources

have a trust to which we must live
up, and for which we must worth-
