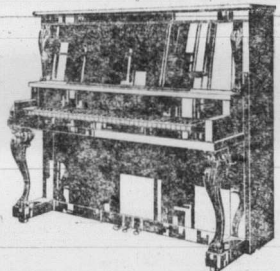

THIS GENERATION

To the Editor of The Gleaner.
 Sir,—My sermon of last Sunday afternoon, so gently denoted by the Rev. Mr. Warren at the anniversary service of the George street Baptist church, was taken from Mat. 24, 23-24, reads as follows: "Now learn a parable of the fig tree. When his branch is yet tender and putteth forth leaves, ye know that summer is nigh. So likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors."
 "These things" are not the events connected with Jerusalem's overthrow in A. D. 70, neither are they the general events of the entire Gospel age for Christ said the "end shall not be yet." But they are those things which give warning of the approaching second advent of Christ. As the budding of the fig tree announces the approach of summer, so the appearance of these things foretells the approaching dissolution. The signs appear in a series, as indicated by the words "And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads, for your redemption draweth nigh."—Luke 21:28.

It is, however, the generation witnessing "all these things" that witnesses also the second coming of Christ. Then it is "near, even at the doors." The last signs are appearing in the "distress of nations with perplexity," therefore the present generation will witness the end of the Gospel age.
 As regards the world's being evangelized before the end, as foretold in Mat. 24:14, it is observed that missionaries during the last hundred years have touched every shore while the Bible has been translated into all languages and the Bible is the only witness that can enter any nation.
 The late interchurch world movement painted the world nearly all black, indicating of its unevangelized state. But it is too black, it has passed into the chronic state of unbelief, of indifference and sin. Instead of being ripe for evangelism it is ripe for judgment. Furthermore, there is a universal consciousness, whether wittingly or unwittingly, that the end of the age and the dissolution of all things is at hand. —(continued)

 London, Oct. 5.—An article of Lord Mayor MacSwiney's long fast, the Irish prisoners have ceased to hunger strike, the London Daily Mail said yesterday.

Ponzi Revelations.
 Boston, Oct. 5.—Jos. Daniels, a furniture dealer, who claimed a partnership with Charles Ponzi, the got rich quick hand, told the referee in bankruptcy yesterday that he gave his attorney, Isaac Harris, \$9,500 of the \$10,000 received in cash from Ponzi and the balance of \$40,000 was devoted by him in the certified check for that amount received in the First National Bank.

Railwaymen's Wage Increase.
 Ottawa, Oct. 5.—The Journal today publishes a statement that clerks, freight handlers, station and other employees of the Canadian National Railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway will receive wage increases averaging about 25 per cent, and dating back to May 1st last.

Montreal Divine Dead.
 Montreal, Oct. 5.—Vernon Rev. Dean Evans, rector of St. Stephen's church, Westmount, died last night in his 75th year, after a little over a day's illness of pneumonia.

Five Children Burn to Death.
 Merrill, Wis., Oct. 5.—Five children of Edward Nelson, ranging from 5 to 14 years, were burned to death yesterday when fire destroyed the Nelson farmhouse.

Nicky Arnstein's Trial.
 New York, Oct. 5.—Trial of Jules W. (Nicky) Arnstein, charged with grand larceny and receiving stolen property in connection with the Wall Street bond thefts, was set for October 25th, yesterday.

Charitable Bequests.
 New York, Oct. 5.—Charitable bequests totalling \$1,350,000 are made in the will of J. H. Schiff, banker and philanthropist, which was filed yesterday in the surrogate's office.

Reprisals in Ireland.
 Dublin, Oct. 5.—Following an unsuccessful Sinn Fein raid for the purpose of burning the police barracks at French Park, County Roscommon, Sunday, reprisals were carried out next day by police and military in motor lorries. Shops, residences, crops and much property destroyed.
