## St. Stephen Smallpox Of Very Worst Type

St. Stephen, N. B., March 7-Dr. Wade, district medical health officer, arrived in town today in connection with the smallpox case which was reported in today's paper. Dr. Wadaid tonight that it was genuine smallpox and of the very worst kind. He will be in town for a day or two night. and every precaution will be taken to stamp out the dreaded disease. Every one that has come in contact with the occupants of the Burgerne home has been vaccinated.

### Flax Disease

Flax is one of those plants which ortunately is not very seriously affected by diseases producing fungi and bacteria, although it is subject to a number of diseases which may, under certain conditions, cause considerable loss through reduction of the yield and quality. The most important of these diseases in Canada is the flax wilt. The fungus causing flax wilt lives in the soil, and attacks young plants chiefly, causing them to wilt and die. It may also attack older plants which turn yellow and die slowly. If flax is continuously grown him. in an infected field the fungus spreads to such an extent as to make the crop almost worthless. This fungus not only lives over in the soil but is spread by its spores clinging to the seed from diseased plants.

This disease can be successfully controlled by adopting three precau ionary measures.

First, by the use of clean plump eed, grown if possible in a field which has shown no sign of the disease, and treated before seeding with a solution of formalin, 1 pound in 40 gallons of water. It takes about one School Report nair gailon of this solution to treat a bushel of seed, and it is most advantageously applied by spraying it on the seed as it is being shovelled over seed should then be frequently raked until the entire surface is damp. The seed should then be frequently raked over to aid in thorough drying. Second, by adopting a system of

rotation which would eliminate the growing of flax on the same land in uccessive years.

Third, by growing those varieties of flax which have been shown to be resistant to the flax wilt in that neighborhood.

The flax is also attacked by a rust which in the early part of the season can be recognized by small, yellow or orange masses of spores serve to spread the disease in the field. At that stage of its development the rust lives over the winte and becomes the source of infection the following spring. This disease is not usually severe in Canada and can be prevented by a proper rotation and the destruction of waste straw and flax refuse that may harbour the disease.

Thus to protect flax from disease the following measurers should be adopted.

1. Use clean plump seed from unin ected fields, and treat it with for malin solution before planting.

2. Do not grow flax in the same field for two successive saasons. 3. Destroy all waste flax straw

and refuse. 4. If wilt is very bad, grow only School Report the varieties which have proved to be resistant to the disease in that

district.
