It was the first day of school. The eleven-year-old son of the house where I was visiting came tearing into the room, his arms filled with books and other school paraphernalia. "Our room beat Sister Margaret's on communions," he announced cheerfully. "We beat them on aspirations, too. We had five thousand and they only had four thousand." His voice died away as he hurried upstairs to put his books away until another year.

Nine thousand aspirations. All indulgence, of course, and it is probable all applicable to the Poor Souls, offered for them. Not to mention the novenas, prayers, Masses heard, communions and other acts of piety and devotion offered during the school year. What treasures these children are laying up for themselves? Not for one year alone, but for every year of their school life, they are gathering up these spiritual souvenirs.

Are we grown-ups doing as well? Nearly every one of us has a private collection of some kind of souvenirs of by-gone affairs which grows larger as the years go by: childhood treasures, carefully preserved cards and booklets for every holiday season.

We have certificates of First Communion and Confirmation which bring back to us every detail of those memorable days. We remember so distinctly the morning we received the Divine Saviour for the first time. The church, all dim and shadowy in the morning light, with the autumn rain beating against the windows. And the day the Bishop, with his retinue of priests, came for confirmation. How excited we all were that day? When it was over we felt that at last we were really full-fledged Catholics, ready to die for our Faith. Our first Rosary, broken and with half the beads lost, but still treasured for the precious memories it recalls.

Souvenirs of more worldly events. Our first valentine. How well we remember the thrill it gave us the morning we received it, so long ago! Various little keepsakes, pleasant reminders of our happy school days. The diplomas we received when we graduated! And so on, each year adding to the collection.

Perhaps all of our souvenirs do not recall happy memories. For most of us there are gray hairs as well as gold. There's father's old prayer book, with its large type for his falling eyes, or mother's thimble, long since put away; a piece of the dress our dear one wore that bright spring morning we laid her away to rest with the Easter lilies on her coffin. We thought that day the sun would never shine for us again; but God is good and comforts as He alone knows how to comfort. After all, the happiest memories are not always the sweetest.

How about these spiritual souvenirs? Do we collect them as zealously? For they will avail us far more in the end and maybe contribute towards our eternal salvation. How many indulgenced aspirations, applicable to the Poor Souls, do we offer each day for them? Some day we, too, may be one of that suffering band, crying in vain for help from those we have left behind. Let us see just how many indulgences we can obtain for them in one day alone. There's a three hundred days' indulgence attached to that little aspiration of only seven words. How many times during the day we can offer this tiny prayer, now for one and then for another. Let us not forget to offer some for ourselves. There are numerous other short prayers bearing indulgences of varying lengths.
