**Grey's Statement.**

The Home Rule debate in the House of Commons yesterday developed nothing new. The Unionists moved the rejection of the second reading of the Home Rule Bill. Sir Edward Grey spoke for the Government. He stated the Government adhered to the position that they were not prepared to make any concession beyond six years' exclusion of the Ulster counties from the operation of the bill as offered by Mr. Asquith. This to our mind is regrettable. It would be far better to give each county the option of staying out as long as it liked, while it would be all right to call upon it to say whether or not it would come in at the end of six years. His reference to a General Election coming on before the question of Ulster could arise in the House is a mere bluff. Within the next six years a general election must come, and if the Unionists win, they could make provision for dissentient counties staying out as long as possible. If the Unionists did not win, these counties must come in automatically. We do not see how the Government can adhere to this attitude, and we shall be surprised if they do not change it. The whole situation appears as if both sides are lining up for a final bargaining for a settlement. Sir Edward Grey's reference to the need of a federal system and his offer to consider an immediate general election on the terms of the passage certain bills show that the Government has not given up the idea of making a hard bargain. Sir Edward was, however, properly firm in his pronouncement that if there was any insurrection or if any attempt was made to set up a Provisional Government, the army would be called upon to put down such acts of rebellion.

**Surgeon's Forced March.**

The question why no proper medical attention was forthcoming for Lieutenant Lloyd Jones, of the King's African Rifles, who was severely wounded in an engagement on the borders of British East Africa, was due to the Colonial Secretary in the House of Commons yesterday by Lord Winterton.  
Mr. Harcourt said he had satisfied himself that everything was done which it was possible to do, having regard to the inaccessibility of the locality. "I am glad to have this opportunity of referring to the devotion of Mr. Parvati, the Indian sub-assistant surgeon at Marsabit," he continued. "He made a forced march to Lieutenant Lloyd Jones, accomplishing it in four days. **Panama Tolls.**

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
The House of Representatives last night after one of the most spectacular legislative struggles in the history of the nation voted to repeal the Provision of the Panama Canal Act, exempting American vessels from payment of tolls. The vote on the Bill, 247 to 161, was but the beginning of a victory for the Administration in the first struggle in the party since Democracy took control of the Government a year ago. To-morrow the Bill goes to the Senate where the fight will be renewed with all the vigor and determination which attended it in the Lower House.
