Explosion at Canadian Plant.

Parry Sound, Ont., Nov. 22.—An explosion, the cause of which is as yet undetermined, but which is generally attributed to the work of alien enemies, occurred at 7.30 to-night in the plant of the Canada Explosives Company, Limited, which occupies an area of nearly three square miles at Nobel, seven miles north of this town, on the Canadian Pacific Railway. Five one-storey buildings, used for the storage of cordite, which the company has been manufacturing in large quantities, were obliterated.

Between seven and eight hundred men are employed in the plant, but so far as is known there was no loss of life, the employees having quit work some time before the explosion took place.

Toronto, Nov. 22.—In view of the suspicious nature of the explosions at the plant of the Canadian Explosives Company, Limited, at Nobel, a detachment of troops is being held in readiness here for prompt dispatch to the scene of the catastrophe if required.

M. Venizelos Sure Germans Bound to Lose War.

New York, Nov. 22.—A cable to the New York Times from London this morning says:

"The Daily News prints a mailed despatch from Athens dated November 9, which gives the following interview with former premier Venizelos:

"I am not a strategist, but two things seem quite clear to me; first, that the Germans are bound to be conquered in the end, from the fact that reserves from which they are drawing their resources are much smaller than those at the disposal of the Allies. The Germans in fact have already passed the zenith of their strength, though still powerful enough to prolong the struggle for a long time.

"Secondly, it seems to me that this new battle ground in the Balkan offers favorable conditions to the Allies. Their position in the west must be strong enough for them to hold on to this and at the same time detach large bodies of troops for use here in the Balkans. It is impossible for them to cut off Germany from the supplies of man and minerals waiting for them in Turkey. The moral effect upon Greece and Roumania of the Allies' success in the Balkans would be considerable. A German reverse in the Balkans, too, would have most serious effects for them at home.

"The German people have been promised so much and been so often disappointed, first in Paris, then in Calais then in the expected surrender of Russia, after the taking of Warsaw, and if this new enterprise, with its much trumpeted aim of opening a road to Egypt, turns out another failure things in the interior of Germany may well be disastrous."

"M. Venizelos spoke, too, of the great effect the German propaganda in the Balkans had had upon Greek public opinion. 'Thanks to this propaganda,' he said, 'a great part of the Greek people, while still ardently desiring the victory of the allies, believe not that Germany will win, but that she has won already.'

"I have the greatest admiration for Sir Edward Grey, but I feel it was a mistake to chill Greek sympathies by offering Kavalla to the Bulgarians without, at any rate, first ascertaining whether the Greeks would accept the bribe. As for the offer of Cyprus to Greece, the feeling of the mass of the Greek people is that it would be too great a risk to accept Cyprus under conditions of a co-operation which, in their opinion, might lead to the forfeit of most of the rest of their territory."

Ship vs. Battleplane.

Remarkable Adventure of a British Vessel in the North Sea.—The "Avocet's" Escape.

The Liverpool Journal of Commerce publishes an account of the miraculous escape of the British steamer "Avocet" from three German aeroplanes—one a big "battle-plane"—which dropped bombs and fired upon her in the North Sea, fortunately being able to "cripple" her. The "Avocet," which arrived at Manchester from Rotterdam, belongs to the Cork Shipping Company, and the story says:

From particulars obtained from those engaged on the steamer it is gathered that on the morning of October 30th, at 11.35, three aeroplanes were observed coming up from the Belgian coast, one being a large battle-plane. In a few minutes they were circling over the ship, and the battle-plane dropped the first bomb, which hit the water fifteen feet away, making a terrific report, flames and water rising over fifty feet, and afterwards leaving the surface of the sea black over a radius of thirty feet, so far as it was possible to

judge. Altogether, thirty-six bombs were dropped, all falling close, six of them missing the steamer by not more than seven feet.

After apparently exhausting all the bombs, the battle-plane took up a position off the port beam and opened fire at the bridge with a machine gun. The ship's sides, deck, and water were struck with many bullets—it was like a shower of hail. A port in the chief engineer's room was pierced and his bed filled with broken glass. The battle-plane was handled with great skill, attacking from a height of from 800 to 1,000 feet. Going ahead of the ship, he turned and came end on to meet her, and when parallel to her dropped his bomb so as to have her full length and make sure of scoring a hit. The ship's helm was put hard-a-star-board and as she swung to port three bombs missed the starboard bow and three the port quarter by at most seven feet. Had the vessel kept her course the bombs would have landed on the forecastle head and poop deck.

The two smaller planes crossed and re-crossed the "Avocet," dropping their bombs as they passed over her. They all made a most determined attempt to sink the ship, which only failed because they hadn't nerve enough to fly lower. After the first bomb was dropped a rapid rifle fire was commenced, which was kept up until the rifles were uncomfortably hot. The chief officer of the "Avocet" was lucky enough to explode a rocket distress signal within a few feet of one Taube; had it hit him there would have been a wreck in mid-air.

The action lasted thirty-five minutes, and when it was over and the aeroplanes flew away the decks of the "Avocet" were littered with shrapnel.
