Act, 1918.The following ruling made by  
The Military Service Board has  
been ordered to be published:  
NOTICE TO REJECTED  
VOLUNTEERS.

That men who have volun-  
teered and have been rejected  
for military service on or before  
May 11th, 1918, and who have  
reported for service as required  
by the Act on forms prescribed,  
will not be called for medical re-  
examination before the 31st of  
October, 1918. Number of Re-  
jection Badge or date of Rejec-  
tion Certificate should be given  
on the printed Report sent in to  
the Registrar.

Any person wishing to claim  
exemption in respect of a Re-  
jected Volunteer coming within  
Class I must do so within the  
time appointed by the Procla-  
mation of the 11th of May,  
1918, or such further time as  
may be allowed by the Exempt-  
ion Tribunal.

OTHER.German People Lab-  
ouring Under Increas-  
ing Load of Debt.

If it is costing Americans more to  
live in these war days, it is costing  
the German people very much more.  
The United States Bureau of Labor  
Statistics has compiled data to show  
that the enormous economic pressure  
which the war has thrust upon the  
civilian population is forcing the aver-  
age German family deeper and deeper  
into debt. The average expenditure  
of the German family having an in-  
come of from 100 to 200 marks is  
now 222.05 marks.

Food prices have advanced in Ger-  
many far out of proportion to the in-  
crease in wages. Two separate in-  
vestigations made by the labor bureau  
show that food costs in Germany have  
advanced 42 per cent, while the aver-  
age in the United States for the last  
year was 25 per cent.

Suppose Uncle Sam told you you  
could spend but twenty-five cents a  
month for movies, candy and other  
luxuries? In Germany the average  
family now has but twenty-six cents a  
month to be spent in this manner.

The average expenditures for other  
purposes are: Food and beverages,  
\$31.51; fuel and light, \$1.95; rent, \$5.  
41; taxes, 95 cents; clothing and re-  
pairs, \$4.03; laundry, soap, etc., \$1.21;  
household utensils and furniture, 35  
cents; books and newspapers, 69  
cents; carfare, 64 cents; physician  
and drugs, 90 cents; barber and bath,  
29 cents; insurance, \$1.12; member-  
ship in trade unions, 65 cents; gifts,  
84 cents; etc. Expenditures for gifts  
cover postage in sending presents to  
members of family in the army or  
navy.

The family with a large income is  
also going into debt, the report  
shows, though not to the same ex-  
tent as the average family. To ob-  
tain even the necessities of life the  
German civilian must either withdraw  
his savings or continue to plunge  
deeper in debt, with food and essen-  
tials advancing rapidly.

If the shoe of Mars pinches a bit,
