**Now's the Day,
Now's the Hour!**

**The Country's Call is for Honest
Men and Good Government.**

It is universally admitted that the time has arrived when we select men with clean hands, men with the honesty of intentions to govern the affairs of the colony. Newfoundland as it never before needs such a Government at the present.

The old colony to-day has her hands outstretched to men of integrity to save her from the perils that threaten her life and future destiny. She is now in a perilous situation and the people from all quarters are crying out and appealing to patriotic and public spirited voters to save her from imminent complete ruin and pending disaster, which would surely befall her if the present Government was by an oversight returned to power.

From North, South, East and West throughout the Colony the call was made for safe, sane and honest Government in substitution of that which prevailed during the past three and a half years.

That men qualified to thus discharge their duty have answered this call is judged best by the representatives of the Liberal-Labor-Progressive Party, who under the leadership of Mr. John R. Bennett, a former Colonial Secretary and for several years acting Prime Minister, have set themselves to the task of once more bringing Newfoundland back to her true position in the British Empire and to the state of prosperity and happiness which was her want to enjoy before the Coaker-Squires administration was born in 1919.

It is imperative that men of proven worth and capacity such as we find in the makeup of the Bennett party should be endorsed. That such men will lend their services to the country in this its hour of threatened destruction at the hands of a number of debased politicians is worthy of highest praise and commendation.

Our strongest and best men are needed to steer the ship of state from the rocks and breakers of graft, greed and incompetence into which it has drifted because of the dishonourable

deeds and personal abuse of the powers enjoyed by the present Government and whose policy have rightly earned the contempt of every self-respecting citizen.

The composition of the present Government is inculcated with a tendency throughout the colony, to set class against class and people against people in a mad effort to keep office. It is comprised of men lacking education and natural ability, who have abused public duties to such an extent that never in the country's history were so many glaring scandals and exposures (already published and yet to be recorded) as that credited to the administration of the day.

The six outstanding figures of the present conglomeration, Messrs. Coaker, McGrath, Squires, Gibbs, Campbell and Collishaw are acclaimed the "Notorious Sextuple Demagogues" who have trampled on the country's constitution, dragged the colony into disrepute by their infamous actions and political debauchery that has been the curse of many a nation and country claiming the rights and privileges of Democracy as we were heretofore led to believe was our inheritance.

Mr. Bennett's record statesmanship and qualifications are all that any leader should possess, and from every indication he and his party is assured of the best interests of the country. Under such a leadership we are confident we can reclaim our position, place and freedom, which were battered away by the greatest gang of political freebooters that ever disgraced a civilized country, as that which is our shame and misfortune to have holding the reins of power to-day.

Knowing all this the Telegram, which is rightly designated "The People's Paper" and the country's organ of Democracy, makes this, a last appeal, to many of its readers to consider well the issues before them to weigh well the advice and warnings that confronts them. On Thursday the

fate of Newfoundland will be contained in the ballot boxes, and because of this the Telegram clearly defines the position and in no uncertain manner sets and pleads for the election of the candidates supporting John R. Bennett.

To you, fellow-countrymen, the appeal is made in behalf of Newfoundland and true Newfoundlanders. To the electorate we say be on your guard. Now's the Day. Now's the Hour.

EARLY CABLES.

FIFTY STEAMERS BARRED BY ICE
NORTH SYDNEY, May 1. A solid field of heavy close packed ice is stretching between the Cape Breton Coast and Newfoundland and far south into the Atlantic. It is estimated this morning to be blocking the passage of at least fifty ocean going steamers, judging from the mass of wireless calls with which the air had been charged during the past 24 hours. The nearest vessels were the Kyle from Newfoundland for North Sydney with passengers and mail which was caught in the ice with a blade lost from her propeller, and the Government steamer Montcalm, from St. Lawrence port en route to aid the steamer Cyrric Queen, ashore near Point Esprit. Both are having a hard time but they are not in danger.

THE LABRADOR TRAGEDY.

ST. JOHN, April 28. According to news received by relatives in St. John, records concerning the death of Miss Marguerite Lindsay, Labrador school teacher, are not yet closed and it is expected there may be startling developments when findings of the official inquiry are made public.

FLOOD CONDITIONS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

FREDERICTON, May 1. New Brunswick is in the grip of flood conditions of such nature as to fast approach the record set in the spring of 1887. The damage is already estimated at a million dollars.

TWO GRADUATES.

MONTREAL, April 28. May Athena Grimes, St. John's, Nfld., and Nellie V. Parsons, Lush's Bight, Nfld., are included in a graduation class of eleven from the Children's Memorial Hospital, here.

GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

OTTAWA, May 1. The Canadian Government Merchant Marine had a deficit last year of \$9,699,000 after all charges had been met. The losses on operations alone was \$2,384,000.

RUN RUNNER LOST.

FISHER'S ISLAND, April 30. British steam yacht Thelma Phoebe was driven ashore here Sunday and twenty-one members of the crew were rescued by a breeches buoy. A negro cook named Roberts was drowned. A number of cases of liquor drifted ashore.

SCHOONER POUNDS TO PIECES.

PORTLAND, Me., April 30. The three-masted schooner Francis Goodnow, of Boston, ran ashore at Mickenney's Point Sunday morning, and was pounded to pieces. Capt. W. J. Johnson and crew were rescued.

SYDNEY MINES THREATEN TROUBLE.

SYDNEY, April 30. Protests against the detention at the border of Alex Howatt, deposed President of the Kansas miners, who was to have been the principal speaker at the Cape Breton May Day demonstrations, were voiced at a mass meeting of Glace Bay and Sydney miners yesterday. Unless Howatt was released the miners threatened in a resolution to resume strike on job tactics.

Hints for Housewives.

When fruit for stewing is very acid a pinch of borax will reduce the acidity.

To make clothes beautifully white, slice an unpeeled lemon into the water in which they are to be boiled. Black shoes can be improved by rubbing them well with the inside of fresh orange peel; polish after with a soft cloth.

To pare apples easily and economically, pour boiling water over them, and let them stand in it for one minute before paring.

To clean a light or white straw hat rub with a lemon dipped in sulphur, wash off with water, and stiffen with white of egg.

To clean black, grey, or variegated marble rub briskly with a cloth wrung nearly dry out of cold water, dust while still damp with flour, dry with fine flannel, and polish with a leather.

A cut lemon rubbed on cloisonne, real or imitation, removes grime, and renews both freshness and lustre.

Clean discoloured crusts by putting into them tea-leaves fresh from the pot, with a little soap and hot water; shake well, and rinse.

To soften a hard sponge, cover with cold water, to which a tablespoonful of borax has been added, bring slowly to the boil in a clean saucepan, take out the sponge, rub dry borax into it, and rinse well in cold water.

Take the knot of the thread through to the right side of the material. It is the wearing of this knot which often causes a button to come off. Now place a pin over the button, and proceed to sew on the button in the usual way, working it over the pin, and entwining the thread at the stem of the button, finally pulling out pin.

By this method there is not the same strain when fastening and unfastening a button, and if properly done will last very much longer.

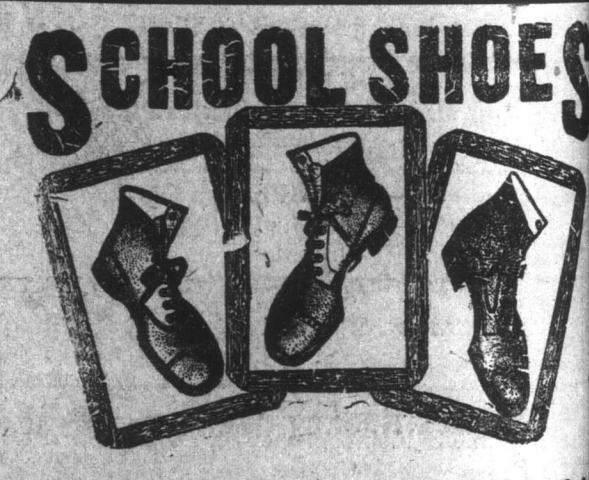

To Seek Solution of Sahara's Mysteries.

An expedition, organized by a Chicago newspaper is about to strike into the heart of the Sahara Desert to attempt to solve one of its most fascinating mysteries--the story of the tribe of Taureg. This tribe of savage Arabs lives about the Plateau of Hagar, and has never recognized any civilized authority.

One of the strange characteristics of the tribe is that both men and women go about at all times with their faces covered with black yells.

Floyd Gibbons, newspaper correspondent, who will head the expedition, has been instructed to find the tribe, study its life and habits, inter-

view its chiefs and give to the world for the first time the story of these strange people.

The expedition expects to reach the region sought, known among the natives as the Land of Terror, by the middle of May. By making frequent night marches, the camel caravan expects to reach Timbuctoo three months after the date of departure.

The military situation existing on the Algerian-Moroccan frontier offers difficulties because at this season of the year nomad bands, often numbering 200, make sorties out of Spanish territory and attack caravans. For this reason the military posts along the border have been reduced to the lowest minimum to provide parties of troops, whose duty it is to intercept the raiders and exterminate them.
