Kill That Fly, and Do it Now!!

The housewife's battle against the ever-dangerous moth has been carried on assiduously down the centuries of home-keeping with success according to her plan of attack, for unless the guard is constant the moth, and its sister pest the fly, will work incalculable damage to such of her possessions as are their prey.

Mischiefous Moths.
It is just now, when furs, blankets, woollens and flannels—which attract moths like a lighted candle—are being laid away for the summer, that special care should be taken to render them free from attack. As moths detect light, air, and cleanliness, and also camphor, naphthalene, bog myrtle and specially prepared "moth balls," one or more of these strong-smelling repellents should be placed among any woollens or furs. These preventives do not actually kill the moths or their eggs, but prevent their seeking a hiding place in the vicinity. The ideal way of preserving furs during the warmer weather is to send them to the furrier's where they are kept in cold storage at a temperature so low that neither the larvae nor the moths themselves can live. But this is naturally an expensive method, and the average housewife must trust to the means at hand.

When blankets and flannels are to be stored for the summer, these should be washed and very well aired first, and the trunk or receptacle for them must also be thoroughly fresh and clean. A chest of cedar wood is a splendid place for blanket storage, as moths dislike the odour of the cedar, but if, too, must be kept absolutely clean and perfectly air-tight. Furs are apt to be dusty and dirty after a hard winter's wear, and as moths love dirt, dust, and grease, the furs should be gently beaten on the wrong side with a cane, and then very carefully combed, before they are put away in company with a moth repellent.

Killing No Murder.
Many excellent housewives who are almost fastidious about moths are prone to ignore the danger of the common house fly, which, with its disease-carrying propensities, may do much more damage to the health of the household than even the notorious moth. Of late attention has been given by the sanitary authorities to the menace of the fly plague, and the women are realizing how the germs may be multiplied and transmitted by milk and food being exposed to the attack of the fly, and how important it is to kill every possible fly when they start to make an appearance. It stands to reason that flies, that have been resting on a rubbish heap outside, or even in an uncovered dustbin, before they enter our homes and settle on our tables cannot be other than a danger to health.

Cover All Food.
All articles of food, when not actually in use, should be scrupulously covered, especially milk, which is so rapidly infected, and jars, out-houses and cellars kept as clean as possible. Flypapers, used lavishly, help to prevent their increase, as do disinfectants placed conveniently about the house and utter cleanliness not only in obvious places, but in out-of-the-way corners, in addition to the maxim "Kill at sight," is the best way of waging a successful battle against this household pest.

Wedding Cake Wonders.
Most Produced by Bride's Touch.
In point of size and cost, the wedding cake made for the Duke of York and his bride has been eclipsed many times.
The largest wedding cake ever made figured among the presents given to Queen Victoria at her Jubilee. It was a duplicate, except in the matter of size, of the cake which graced the wedding breakfast when the Queen was married to the Prince Consort.
The jubilee cake, which weighed nearly two hundredweight, was fifteen feet in height. It cost £600, and was decorated with real flowers and silk flags. Although many years have elapsed since it was made, this magnificent example of the confectioner's art has never been equalled.
Adorned With Ostrich Feathers.
Incidentally, the smallest wedding cake was made a few years later to the order of an eccentric peeress, whose only son was about to be married. It was three inches high, and weighed a quarter of a pound—a perfect wedding cake in miniature costing twenty guineas.
A titled woman gave a West-End firm an order for a cake weighing 130lb. and standing 12ft. in height, its three tiers being adorned with festoons of real ostrich feathers. The cake cost £350.
Another remarkable cake was made for the wedding of a noted Master of Foxhounds. It was decorated with silver hunting trophies in miniature, while around the base was arranged a sugar representation of a fox hunt, with hounds in full cry.
The wedding cake made for a famous architect consisted of a confectionery copy of his greatest work, a well-known art gallery; while a celebrated musician's design for his wedding cake took the form of a grand piano, successfully reproduced in sugar and other ingredients, even to the keys, which sounded when touched.
