

Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

London, May 16th.—Advices from Rio Janeiro to April 24th have been received. Some changes had taken place in the Brazilian Cabinet. The latest advices from the seat of war on the Paraguay are that the fortress of Humaita has been shelled by the allied batteries, and an assault is expected by the army under Marquis de Caltas. Two Paraguayan gunboats had been sunk by the Brazilian batteries.

Berlin, May 16.—The Zollverein Diet in session has passed an act levying a tobacco tax, and a duty of six shillings per acre on the land under cultivation, and a duty of six shillings per 100 weight on the production.

American Despatches.

Washington, May 16th.—Immediately on the denunciation of not guilty on the 11th article, Mr Williams moved an adjournment until Tuesday, the 20th inst. The motion was carried by 32 to 21, and the court then adjourned.

Chicago, May 16th.—Flour dull, prices nominal; wheat in good demand, declined 1/4c; sales No. 1 at \$2.00 @ \$2.10; No. 2, quiet at \$2.01 1/2. Oats moderately active at an advance of 1c @ 1 1/4c. Barley dull and nominal. Beef cattle dull and nominally lower.

New York, May 18.—Herald's Havana special gives important news from Hayti. President Salnave escaped from Port Haytien and reached Port au Prince. He and Gen. Delorme, who acts as Secretary of State, arrested many citizens and ordered some to be shot. Robberies and murders were frequent. The stores of six American merchants had been robbed by the troops. Salnave threatened to seize the town and burn it to ashes, and also used violent menaces to foreign Consuls. Many Americans had been shot at in their own windows, and forced to seek refuge in American Consulate. The U. S. Consul had an interview with Salnave and Delorme. They demanded protection but were received defiantly and with threats. The American Minister at once sent a despatch to Havana for some American men-of-war to go to his assistance; he also sent to Jamaica for a British war steamer. Later despatches say a British gunboat had gone from Jamaica to the assistance of the American Minister at Port au Prince. Latest despatch from Port au Prince states that the whole country is reported in arms against President Salnave, excepting Gonaives, Jacmel and the Cape. The revolution in the north has been successful. The entire south is now in arms against the Government. Telegraphic advices from Venezuela to 22nd April were received. The treaty with the rebels expired on 12th—result was unknown, but private property was being secured on every hand, and stored in Custom House to pay government debt.

The Arrests at Guelph.

The Leader to-day publishes a communication from Chief Constable Kelly denying in toto the allegations made in a former letter signed "Spectator." The tone of the reply is very mild; the facts connected with the arrest are stated lucidly and connectedly, and while the Chief exculpates himself from the charge of cowardice he refrains from all comment on the conduct of Follis. The circumstances as stated in this communication are similar in nearly every respect to those which we published on Friday last, and consequently corroborative of our assertions.

A man named Gordon Stewart, an agent for a publishing house in Hartford Conn., came over from Buffalo to Fort Erie last Monday on business, and when on his return to the ferry boat he was knocked down and robbed of \$400 and a gold watch. No clue has been found as to the perpetrator.
