Town and County News.

HALLOWEEN SHOW.—This show comes off at Milton on the 10th and 11th October.

OSBORN SEWING MACHINE.—The Osborn Sewing Machine was on Tuesday last awarded the first prize as the best sewing machine at the Ottawa Valley Agricultural Exhibition now being held in Ottawa.

IMPORTANT TO CONSUMERS OF GAS.—At a meeting of the Directors of the Guelph Gas Company held on the 14th inst., the following resolution was proposed and carried:—"Resolved that while they cannot at this season of the year meet the views of Messrs. Bell & Co. and other large consumers, they will at the close of the financial year, namely the 1st of January next, consider favorably the question of making a discount bonus to large consumers in proportion to quantity consumed, provided the state of the Company's accounts permit of the same, and that the Secretary be instructed to communicate the foregoing to Messrs. Bell, with the assurance that any resolution on the subject advanced by the Board of Directors will be general in its character."

TORONTO CATTLE MARKET.—Receipts were larger during the last three days and fully up to the wants of buyers. Prices are weak and have declined about 25c, which is due in some measure to unfavorable accounts of the Montreal market. First-class are not likely to bring over \$4.25, or second-class over \$3 to \$3.25. Third class are utterly neglected.

There were sales yesterday in one car of mixed, averaging 950 lbs., at \$33; two cars of steers, averaging 1125 lbs., at \$43, and one car of steers, averaging 1800 lbs., at \$49. Sheep also are rather slack in price. Doves of first-class will not often go for \$5.25 to \$5.27. There was a drove of mixed grades, we presume sold at \$4.75. Lambs are still in good demand. Doves of first-class will still bring \$2.25 to \$2.75. A lot of heads sold at \$3.40. Calves are scarce, quiet and unchanged.

The Guelph club have had a very successful season's play, and can doubtless hold their own against any team of any Provincial club. Subjoined is the score of the match.

Meeting of Presbytery. At the meeting of Presbytery in connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church on Tuesday, in Arthur, Mr. D. McDonald was unanimously called by the congregation there to be their minister. A letter was read from Mr. Duncan Davidson, declining the call given him by the congregation of South Luther and Amaranth. The call was accordingly set aside, and an application liberty was granted to have a fresh moderation. Mr. Millican to preside on such a day as may be deemed most suitable. Leave was given to the congregation of the Union Church, Galt, to change the arrangements made by the Presbytery for holding a general assembly, in that arrangement interfered with the time usually set apart for dispensing the ordinance of the Lord's Supper in the congregation. The Clerk was instructed to apply to the Home Mission Committee for a grant from the Central Fund to enable the congregation in Amaranth to discharge liabilities contracted for supply of sermon by missionary Students and Probationers.

POLICE COURT. Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., P. M. Mrs. ROSANNA WAINMAN, of Hotel, was charged by Inspector Ainley, with selling liquor after hours on Saturday night, the 14th inst. Fined \$20 and costs.

NEW COLONIZATION SCHEME.—THE TOPIC correspondent of the Hamilton Times says—A new emigration and settlement scheme has been proposed to the Ontario Government, by Mrs. Bret, (a sister of Miss Macpherson) who has taken an active part in emigration matters. It is briefly described as being a grant of 5,000 acres in Muskoka, the Government to clear a part and erect log huts, the huts to be erected where the emigrants will stop on their arrival, and afterwards settle on portions of the land grant. Another home is to be erected in Great Britain where intending emigrants will collect. Hon. Mr. McKellar to whom the project was made known, promised that the scheme would receive the consideration of the Government.

Local and Other Items.

GRAIN HARVEST is about finished in the village of Rockwood on Tuesday. The weather is so ripe for the coming winter's operations at Ottawa as present.

SHAYMEN are being engaged by the haulers for the coming winter's operations in the woods.

HILL, the party who attempted the assassination of Barley the other evening in Toronto, has been arrested.

It is said that the enlargement of the Globe has entailed an additional expense upon the Globe Publishing Company of \$30,000 per annum.

The Hamilton Times says that the Colorado bug, after having eaten up all the potato stalks, and played old hub-bub on the tomato stalks, have now commenced to devour the newly-laid sidewalk on HUGHSON STREET.

The fire-school house at New Aberdeen was formally opened on Thursday night last, when a soiree was held, the attendance being large. There was realized \$32, which go to purchase books for the Sabbath School.

ROBBERY IN GALT.—The Reformer says that on Wednesday night, a man named Holmes stole from a plasterer in Barnhardt's Hotel, a watch, \$18 and some clothing. Holmes was traced to Paris, but beyond that nothing further has been heard of him.

HILLSBURG FAIR.—This fair was held on Friday last, and considering it was the 2nd one, was quite a success. There were a lot of cattle on the ground, and several changed hands at fair prices. There was not much outside demand, there being few buyers from a distance present.

THERE is a rumor in Toronto that the company proprietorship of the Mail will dispose of the office and plant to a partnership, and that William McDougall will be the editor-in-chief. Offers of stock in the company have been made at a considerable discount. Its attempt to compete with the Globe has proved too much for it.

THE Great Western Railway Company has just put on the road a number of new cars, which are greatly and comfortably fitted up with cushioned seats and accommodations for passengers who, not being able to catch the regular express trains, may have frequent chances of going by these freights, which travel at a good rate of speed, and are sure to stop at all way stations, which the mail trains do not always do. We are sure that this convenience will be much appreciated by the travelling public.

BLONDIS FEATS.—The great ropewalker, Blondin, whose feats at Niagara, some years since, will be remembered, appeared at the Sydneyham Crystal Palace on the 16th inst., and performed a feat which was never seen at any local show. "Altogether Eramosa, perhaps carried off the largest number of prizes in this class, we yet noticed that other townships—namely Esqueving—is coming to the front in the quantity and quality of sheep raised, and the farmers there deserve credit for their enterprise in improving their breeds. Pigs were quite numerous and very good, but they could not be shown to advantage, as they were cooped up in the wagons. There were very few fowls, but what there were of them were good."

THERE was but a meagre show of fall wheat, but spring was much better represented, there being twelve entries in this class. Other grains were well represented, and the quality generally was excellent. The display of roots was good, but not so good as in some of the other classes. Potatoes were splendid and the entries were fully up to the average, there being 17 of early Rose, and 13 of other kinds, also 8 collections of potatoes, representing a great many varieties. Turnips were equally numerous, and equally good, especially in the class of Swedes, there being 86 entries of this kind. There was a very fair show of vegetables. Onions were very superior, and tomatoes were large and good. We have seen a larger, but not a better display of butter. In salt butter there were 21 entries and 22 of fresh, and the quality generally was excellent. In cheese the competition was not keen, there being only 5 entries. There were 16 entries of beautiful home made bread.

THERE was a very creditable display of domestic manufactures. The fannels and filled cloths were greatly admired. Several samples of tweeds & co., from the Woolen Factory of Messrs Harris & Co., of Rockwood, attracted much attention, and visitors were unanimous in their opinion that the cloth, in style, quality and finish was very superior and highly creditable to the enterprising proprietors. The filled cloth which took the first prize was also filled and finished by them. The other woolen work in socks, mitts, &c., was fully equal to anything we have seen in the line of any local show. There were some fine samples of maple sugar, and honey in the comb and strained. We may include in the manufactured goods two sets of excellent harness, and some fine shoemaker's work.

THERE were but few implements on the ground, but those that were both in quality, make and pattern first class. Messrs Thain, Elliott & Co., exhibited, though not for competition, two of their superior straw cutters.

THE section has always been noted for its fruit, but the display this year was full and superior, to any we have seen in the district. There were 53 entries of apples of all kinds, an excellent display of pears, and a splendid show of plums—26 entries. Though late in the season, the flowers were abundant and very good, the best we have seen at any country show. Some of the bouquets were very tastefully arranged.

IN the ladies' work there was, if not a large, yet a very select assortment of work. The wax and wreath work was very fine, the hair work tastefully done, and some of the most work very beautiful. In the other departments the work was scarcely if at all inferior, and altogether the display was most creditable to the taste and skill of the lady exhibitors.

THE agents of the Raymond and Osborn Sewing Machines were present during the day, showing the excellencies of the machines exhibited by them.
