#### THE CROW'S NEST CHARTER.

Several of our contemporaries have devoted their ditorial columns recently to pointing out the incalculable injury inflicted on the reputation of the Dom-· inion by reckless and unmeasured vituperation of public men. It has been urged with justice that if our leading statesmen and officials were half as bad as they are painted by the Opposition press, we should be nothing better than a country of thieves and liars. This is a singular feature of Canadian public life and one which cannot be too strongly deprecated.

Among the public men who have fallen ceived a fuller measure than the Hon. Joseph Martin, the present Attorney-General of the Province; and of the countless enormities of which it was predicted he was capable, and would assuredly accomplish, perhaps the most significant was to be the repeal of the land grant conveyed in what is known as "The Crow's Nest Charter."
