West Middlesex Spring Show at Stratford on the 22nd, and North Middlesex at Alisa Craig on the 21st.

Mr. Philimore, agent for the well-known firm of McColl Bros. & Co., Toronto, was in the village on Saturday.

Gregor McGregor, formerly of Moss township, has been elected Mayor of Rapid City, Manitoba, by acclamation.

John Vroman, of Longwood Station, has been fined \$20 and costs by Squire Noble, of Stratford, for selling liquor without a license.

Mr. M. McGowan, warden of Middlesex, and reeve of Carleton, was married last Wednesday, at Adelaide, to Miss Mary A. Smith.

Mrs. Middlemiss has sold the home-stead in the village of Middlemiss, to Mr. C. W. Wade. It was the first house built in the village. Price \$850.

When cows have learned to read, then, and not till then, will it pay enterprising merchants to advertise their business on wayside fences, trees and gateposts.

On Monday, 30th, a new time-table is to go into effect on the C. W. division, E. T. R. The new No. 6 Atlantic express going east will be timed to stop at Glencoe every morning.

Probably the oldest resident of Western Ontario died at Princeton a few days since—Mrs. Chatsworth who had attained the great age of 112 years. Her husband died 27 years ago. She was of English origin.

Mr. Smith, whose brother lately died, was on Friday evening presented with an address of condolence by the members of the Hallelujah Band, of which Mr. Smith is leader. The address was handsomely embossed by Mr. George Bousfield.

Mr. H. C. Dixon returned from the South on Saturday afternoon. He was very much pleased with his trip, but was disappointed on returning to find the weather as cold as when he left. Next time he will prefer waiting until spring before returning.

Mr. Walper, who lost his grist mill at Middlemiss by fire, proposes to build one at Lawrence, worth \$12,000, provided the people of that vicinity will give him a bonus of \$2,000. The people of Middlemiss guarantee him a bonus of \$1,000 if he will rebuild the mill in their village.

The month of February last, according to the report of the Toronto Meteorological office, was nearly 12° colder than the average of 45 years, and was with one exception the coldest month during that period. The exception was February of 1875, which averaged a fraction of 1° colder. The temperature of the month was below the average throughout Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and the Northern Provinces, the most marked difference being in Ontario.

The West Middlesex Scott Act Committee met at Mount Brydges on Wednesday afternoon. The organization of the different municipalities was carefully considered, and found to be in a very complete and satisfactory condition. Arrangements were made for a thorough system of public meetings to discuss the merits of the Act, as soon as the day of voting is fixed. In the evening a public meeting was held to discuss the merits of the Act. The speakers in favor of the Act were Rev. Messrs. W. M. Pomeroy, T. Macdunn, and Mr. D. L. Leitch. Mr. George Bousfield opposed the Act.

A much needed improvement in the way of convenience for immigrants going west is a new sleeping car designed especially for immigrant travel, and now attracting a good deal of attention at the Grand Trunk depot. The wood-work is ash, which is nicely finished and decorated, and the arrangements for water, light and heat are perfect. The seats are so contrived that they may be turned into sleeping berths at night, while over head the arrangements are after the fashion of the Pullman cars, but here, the immigrants being expected to provide clothing, &c. The Grand Trunk company intend to build several of these cars in time for the opening of the immigration season.—*Montreal Gazette.*

The Scott Act was adopted in three municipalities in Ontario Thursday and defeated in Mississauga county, Que. In the city of St. Thomas, the measure was sustained by 754 to 743—a majority of 11. In Elgin county the majority for was over 1,600; in Lambton, there was a favorable majority of over 2,000 with 21 places to hear from, which are expected to swell the total majority to 5,000. The anti's were successful in Mississauga, their majority being 40. The Act will not come into force in the constituencies where it was endorsed Thursday till May, 1886. Up till date, the prohibitory enactment has been carried in 59 out of 70 municipalities in which a vote has been taken. Welland and Haldimand are the only counties in which those in favor of the Act are not organized.

Details of a battle in the Soudan on Sunday are to hand. The British loss was 6 officers and 94 men killed, 5 officers and 136 men wounded. The rebel loss was 3,000 killed and wounded. Another battle is expected daily to take place.

It is understood a reply of a somewhat unfavorable nature has been received from Russia in relation to the Afghan frontier question. The situation is still very critical. Orders have been received at Plymouth to prepare all available vessels immediately for active service.

An uprising has taken place in the Northwest, and Louis Reil with 500 followers has taken possession of Duck Lake, a place and way between Clark's Crossing and Carlton. A battle has already occurred between Reil's followers and the mounted police, in which fifteen of the latter were killed. There is great excitement in Winnipeg over the rebellion, and buglers are galloping all over the city summoning to arms. Reil has destroyed the branch telegraph line between Clark's Crossing and Prince Albert. His followers are chiefly French half-breeds that served under him during the Red River rebellion. Very few Indians are believed to have joined him. The feeling is that it is a very serious affair, and further news is anxiously looked for.
