Z. Leiter, of Washington, formerly of Chicago. The ceremony will be performed at noon at St. John's Episcopal Church. Mr. Curzon is expected to arrive in New York on the Majestic today. He spent last winter in Afghanistan and wrote a series of letters from Cabul to the London Times, which evinced a comprehensive grasp of the political conditions in that country, and which attracted wide attention in Great Britain.
