The construction of the building rendered it difficult to get at the fire, and two elevators and stairways acting as air flues made the back portion of the building a veritable fire-trap. On the top flat was stored about 100 crates of cut glass and fine china, in the original packages. The goods in these crates were packed with straw. This, together with loose stuff in the room, and the empty crates, created a furious blaze. On the third floor was stored the majolica ware, granite ware and general staple goods in the original packages. These, too, were packed with inflammable materials.

THE ORIGIN A MYSTERY.

Just where the fire started is a mystery, and no conjectures were made as to how it may have started, but it is generally conceded that the origin was in the third story, toward the southwest corner. An old stove is situated in this corner, but it has not been used for nearly a year. The second story is thought by some to have been the birthplace of the conflagration, as on this flat was situated the kiln. The upstairs kiln has not been in use for three weeks, and no materials capable of spontaneous combustion were in the building. The fire, once started, developed with lightning rapidity. Along the west side of the building, on the third and fourth flats, the smoke curled forth from the joints of the bricks nearly the whole length of the structure. The fire-fighters were clustered on the east side, busily engaged on the third and fourth stories, doing their best to quench the flames, but with little success, and while three streams played on the east side, the lames developed on the west. 
