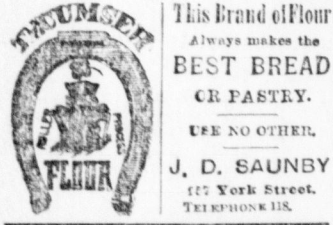

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 7.—The great reservoir of the Portland Water Company burst yesterday morning, letting loose 20,000,000 gallons of water in fifteen minutes. The immense mass of water thus suddenly loosed dashed with a mighty power upon the two houses occupied by the families of Michael Lippin and Dennis Conley. The buildings were crushed as if they had been made of cardboard, and four persons lost their lives—Mrs. Dennis M. Conley, Miss Agnes Conley, Lizzie Maine Conley and James Mosely.
