Sabbath School Workers Hold Interesting Afternoon and Evening Sessions—Many Excellent Addresses Given.

The London district Methodist Sunday school convention resumed its sessions yesterday afternoon at the Dundas Center Church at 2 o'clock. Rev. J. W. Holmes conducted devotional exercises, and a number of interesting and instructive papers were given. Mr. C. A. Barnes spoke on "The Requisites of a Successful Teacher"; Rev. J. Morrison, on "The Value of Oral and Ocular Illustrations in Teaching"; Mr. C. E. German, on "The Necessity and Art of Questioning"; Miss Brennan, on "Kindergarten Methods"; and Mrs. G. The papers were all freely discussed by the members, and many useful suggestions given. In the evening, an open meeting was held, and the spacious school room was well filled. Rev. Both the speakers were listened to with deep interest.

Solos were sung in fine voice by Miss Couke and Miss Hooper. The convention closed at 10 o'clock by all singing the "National Anthem."

METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Oct. 12—8 p.m.—The low area to the westward of the lake region is moving slowly northward. On the eastern side of it fine weather and summer temperature prevail, while on the west side the weather is cold, and heavy snowfalls are reported from the Northwest States and Canadian Territories. It is very improbable that these conditions will continue very long, but as yet there is no indication of an easterly movement. The weather today has been showery in Northern and Northwestern Ontario. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 44-54; Kamloops, 34-44; Calgary, 18-24; Prince Albert, 26-34; Qu'Appelle, 28-32; Winnipeg, 38-42; Port Arthur, 40-48; Parry Sound, 50-64; Toronto, 55-70; Montreal, 60-66; Quebec, 54-66; Halifax, 42-68.

Local temperatures.—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory here on Thursday, Oct. 12, were: Highest, 73°; lowest, 59°.

Today the sun rises at 6:29; sets at 5:39. Moon rises at 2:33 p.m.; sets at 12 midnight.
