## MOSQUITO BITE

Resulted in a Clearly Defined and Fatal Case of Yellow Fever.

Hayana, Aug. 28.-It is now definite ly known that the man who was bitten by an infected mosquito, after inoculation with the serum of Dr. Caldas, the Brazilian expert, has developed a genuine case of yellow fever. Dr. Caldas has not yet seen the patient. Of the eight persons bitten by in fected mosquitoes in connection with the experiments conducted by the vellow fever board during the last three weeks, three have died. Three others who took the fever are expected to recover. Two have not yet developed the disease.

Thus far during August there have been two deaths from yellow fever in Havana, as compared with an average of more than 50 for the month of August during the previous eleven

WHERE BUTTER IS WANTED. Ottawa, Aug. 28.-Mr. J. A. Ruddick, assistant dairy commissioner, has re turned from an inspection of creameries, which are being operated by the government in the Maritime Provinces. He states that owing to the drouth there will be a shortage of butter, especially in Prince Edward Some of the creameries and factories visited produced very superior kinds of butter and cheese. The Maritime Provinces are doing a growing trade in cheese and butter with the West Indies.
