LORD AYLMEY'S COAT OF ARMS

Will Be Used by Town of Aylmer on Municipal Stationery.

Toronto Globe: Colonel Lord Aylmer, descendant and grandson of the governor-general of that name, recently received a letter from Mr. A. H. Backus, chairman of the finance committee of the town of Aylmer, Ontario, asking permission to use the coat of arms of the family on the stationery of the municipality. Mr. Backus prefaces the application by stating: "Up to 1835 this place was a small hamlet, and the place of meeting for transacting the little local business and to discuss all matters of a local interest was a wagon shop. The name of the post-office was Troy, and at the above date, just prior to the rebellion of 1837, feelings of loyalty ran pretty high, and the inhabitants of the locality met at Caswell's wagon shop and unanimously voted that they would no longer have the name of Troy, but would ask that the name be changed to Aylmer, after Lord Aylmer, the then Governor-General of Canada, and such name was sent on to the postoffice department." Mr. Backus adds that Aylmer has grown into a town of 2,500, with several miles of cement walks, a first-class collegiate institute, a complete electric light system and a good waterworks system.

Lord Aylmer has replied that he has great pleasure in granting the request, and expressed the opinion that the adoption of the Aylmer "coat of arms" was a fitting sequel to the bestowal of the name upon the former hamlet, now grown into a prosperous town. It seems that Lord Aylmer's ancestor, when governor-general, passed through the settlement subsequently named after him, on a visit to Colonel Talbot, a military acquaintance who had gone to reside in Western Ontario.

CENSURED COUNSEL

Mr. Justice Ferguson Speaks His Mind to Lawyers.

In Future Counsel Must Be Ready When Cases Are Called—Two Cases Settled.

The winter assizes for the county of Middlesex were continued yesterday before Mr. Justice Ferguson. The absence of criminal business makes the sitting one of little interest to the general public, and those present are for the most part jurors or parties interested in the different cases.

At yesterday morning's session counsel for the plaintiff in Rose vs. Croden made application to amend statement of claim. Application was refused with costs.

In the case of Burke vs. Burke, an application was made for a commission to examine a witness de bene esse. The application was granted.

Motion to transfer several jury cases to the non-jury list was made. Judge Ferguson said he would consider such motions when the cases were called.

At the afternoon session the jury case of Sharkey vs. Williams was taken up. Mrs. Laura Sharkey sued to recover \$250 damages for the alleged wrongful removal of a piano which was being paid for on time. The defendants were Bert Williams, of Ottawa, formerly of this city, and D. H. Porter, of London. After all the evidence was in, Judge Ferguson dismissed the jury, saying it was a case which he could dispose of. He reserved judgment.

The case finished, it was found that the defense in the following case, Glenn vs. Rudd, was not present, which caused Judge Ferguson to say some uncomplimentary things about the members of the London bar and their methods. Counsel for the plaintiff hastened to the telephone to summon the defense.

Live Items Culled for Busy People's Information.

Measles is epidemic in St. Thomas. Mumps is also prevalent.

The congregation of the First Baptist Church, Woodstock, have accepted the resignation of their pastor, Rev. R. R. McKay.

The death occurred at St. Thomas on Saturday evening of Mrs. Harriet Ainley. Her husband, Joseph Ainley, died about 16 years ago. It is supposed that the death was due to an apoplectic fit. The deceased was in the 70th year of her age. She was a daughter of the late W. Seils, of Payne's Mills.

Messrs. Von Neubronn & Co., cigar manufacturers, of Berlin, have made a voluntary assignment to Messrs. Linden & Brier, and their factory is closed. As a result 25 hands are out of employment, but it is thought that as soon as matters can be adjusted operations will be resumed at the factory, with Mr. Frank Von Neubronn as manager.

The South African Club, composed of Windsor men who saw service in the Boer war, at a meeting on Monday decided to open subscription lists for funds for a memorial for their fallen comrades.

Major E. H. Rothwell, of Detroit, has secured \$25, and each of the members will contribute \$5. The collections will be supplemented by the proceeds of a number of concerts to be given. The memorial will probably take the form of a public drinking fountain near the post-office. An effort will be made to raise \$1,500 for the purpose.

DETAILS OF THE VOTING

According to City Clerk Kingston's Official Returns.

They Show Remarkably Few Inaccuracies in Those Published by The Advertiser.

The complete official returns of the municipal election were completed yesterday by City Clerk Kingston. They show that the hastily compiled figures published in The Advertiser were remarkably accurate. All the names of elected nominees were correct, and the changes in the figures are trifling.

The Advertiser placed Mayor-Elect Beck's majority at 1,820, and the Free Press at 1,817. The official figure is 1,826, six more than The Advertiser gave him. The official figures for Bartram, Parnell and Beck are, respectively, 95, 2,223 and 4,040. The Advertiser gave Bartram and Beck the same, and Parnell six more, and the Free Press gave Bartram one more, Beck seventeen more and Parnell twenty-six more.

The Advertiser gave Waterman a majority of 2,312, four more than the official figures.

The figures in the case of Messrs. Jones and Little differed two and one respectively, and Mr. Pocock's was eight more than The Advertiser gave him.

The Advertiser's figures were correct with the exception of the first ward, in which Teasdale's majority was placed ten more than the official returns give him.

The figures for the McClary bylaw differed only four, and for the White bylaw six.
