#### DEATH OF CLARKE GAMBLE

Was Well-Known Here, Where He Resided for Five Years.

Many Londoners will hear with regret of the death of Clarke Gamble, K.C., one of the best known and oldest barristers in Ontario. The death occurred on Sunday morning at the home of his son-in-law, I. F. Hell-muth, K. C., Deer Park, Toronto. He had been ill only a week. Mr. Gamble was born in Kingston in 1808, and came to Toronto at an early age, when there were only one or two brick houses in the city. He was educated at Bishop Strachan School and after being called to the bar entered the law office of the late Judge James C. McCauley. Subsequently he was admitted into partnership with the late William Boulton of the Grange and the late Hon. John Beverley Robinson. He retired from active practice in 1895, but for several years before that was in partnership with his son, H. C. Gamble, who is still practicing in Toronto. For five years after retiring to private life, Mr. Gamble lived at the home of Mr. I. F. Hellmuth, in this city, going to Toronto when his son-in-law moved to that city. He was the last surviving members of a family of 13 children. For 23 years he was a churchwarden of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto. Mr. Gamble is survived by three daughters, Miss Sarah Gamble and Mrs. Hellmuth, Toronto; Mrs. Bowker, of England, and four sons, Clarke and Gordon of British Columbia, and H. C. Gamble, barrister, and Alleyne Gamble, both of Toronto. The funeral will take place at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow from St. James
