PLENTY OF STURGEON IN DETROIT RIVER

Dozen 75 to 125 Pounders Captured Daily-Catch Much Better Than Usual.

Detroit, May 3.-The sturgeon fishing at Fox Island, at the mouth of the Detroit River, is better this year than it has been before in many years. Where the fishermen usually catch three or four per week they are catching ten and fifteen per day, the fish averaging from 75 to 125 pounds each. All under 25 pounds weight must be put back

into the river. The fishermen are making big money as they receive \$10 apiece for the fish. The sturgeon are sold to a Sandusky firm which makes caviar of the eggs and cans the meat. The caviar is sent to Berlin, where it is sold at enormous prices to wealthy Germans. Most of the fishermen who are on the grounds this year live at Grosse Ile. They say that the caviar from Detroit River sturgeon is the best, and that it is reserved for the German nobility.
