FOR HOUSEKEEPERS.

There was a large crowd of farmers and others at the market here this forenoon. It should have been satisfactory to holders of the produce offered, as sales were easily made and prices were firm.

Hay and straw to some loads of hay sold at \$9 to \$9.50 per ton. Three loads of straw sold at \$3.50 per load.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was in large supply, at 16c to 18c per lb for crocks and 18c to 19c for pounds. Eggs were a trifle lower in price, at 11c to 11 1/2c for the crate and basket lots; 12c was paid for the single dozen.

Vegetables and Roots—There was a large quantity of potatoes on sale, at 75c per bag by the load, and 80c to 85c by the single bag. Parsnips, 40c per bag. Rhubarb, 25c to 30c per dozen. Asparagus, 75c to \$1 per dozen. Lettuce and radishes, 25c to 30c per dozen bunches. Tomato, cabbage and celery plants sold at 15c per box.

Dressed Hogs—Only a few on sale, at \$15 per cwt.

Live Hogs—It is understood that \$3.40 will be the price for choice hogs for shipment from here on Monday.

Poultry—Quite a lot on sale, at 65c to 90c per pair for dressed and 50c to 60c per pair for live chickens; turkeys are held at 12c to 13c per lb.

Meats—Bacon is in demand, at 7c to 8c per lb by the carcass; veal, 5c to 7c. Hides—Prices advanced 1/2c per lb, and are now quoted at 6 1/2c, 6 3/4c and 6 1/2c for No. 1, 2 and 3c.
