management of the New York Life. Mr. Perkins had been apprised of fact that the grand jury had acted in his case and he was in court when mediately released in \$10,000 bail, which was furnished by J. P. Morgan, jun., and Cleveland H. Dodge, both of whor wanted to express their confidence in

Mr. Perkins Mr. Fairchild is in Europe. There is nothing to show that he knew anything of what was going on in the grand jury room. He has been in Europe for some time. It is expected that when he hears of the indictments against him he will return.

There are six indictments against Mr. Perkins and six against Mr. Fairchild. They all grow out of the same transaction, the so-called dummy sale of stock of the Chicago and Northwest-Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway to the New York Security and Trust Com-

The New York Security and Trust Company, of which Mr. Fairchild was president, was at the time of the "Prussian loan" controlled by the New York Life Insurance Company, which held the majority of the stock.
