### JOHN CHARLTON.

The late John Charlton was a muchreviled man prior to 1896, but he outlived all enmities. Long before his death he heard his own praises sounded in quarters which had been the least friendly. This experience would have been denied him if he had entered the Government. For some years past his party opponents have described him as an "Old Liberal." It is a term of which they are extremely fond, because it serves a double purpose. It is intended as a compliment to the individual and an aspersion upon his party. It is never by any chance applied to a cabinet minister

until he dies or resigns. Mr. Charlton was born in the United States of British parents. Although he came to Canada when a very young man, the circumstance of having been bern across the line was often unfairly used against him in the days of the agitation for closer commercial relations with the republic. 
