

CANADIAN FINANCIAL CAPTAINS GET BIG UNITED STATES RAILWAY

All-British Syndicate Said To Be in Control of the Rock Island and Plan Vast New Transcontinental System.

[Associated Press Dispatch.]

New York, July 28.—While Kuhn, Loeb & Co. made no official announcement today regarding the developments whereby the holdings of a syndicate in Rock Island, Lehigh Valley and Missouri Pacific stocks were taken over to prevent further serious liquidation, the com-

Pacific stocks were taken over to prevent further serious liquidation, the company in connection with English interests, headed by Sir Ernest Cassell, has secured the largest single holding of Rock Island, both common and preferred.

The syndicate is said to have been made up of Canadian and English, headed by Dr. F. S. Pearson. The decline in the market upset their plans and necessitated a turning over of the stocks involved. The new holders should be able to effect the practical union of the various properties with little further outlay of capital.
