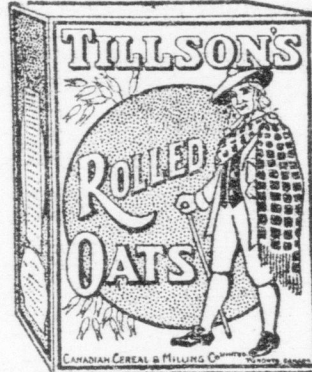

TRADE COMMISSION FOR THE EMPIRE

Lord Inchape Appointed To Act as Chairman of the Body.

UNIONIST OBJECTIONS

Say That Several Extreme Partisans Are Included in the Personnel.

London, April 4.—In the British House of Commons, Mr. Lewis Harcourt announced the completion of the Imperial Trade Commission, the representatives to be Lord Inchape as chairman, Sir Rider Haggard, Sir Edgar Vincent, Sir Charles Owens, and T. Garnett, cotton manufacturer, Manchester.

William Lorrimer Glasgow, M. P., has been deliberately excluded in order to avoid any question of party politics. Completing the commission are Hon. George E. Foster, Canada; Donald Campbell, Australia; Sir W. Bowring, Newfoundland; Sir David Graaf, South Africa, and Sir Joseph Ward, New Zealand.

W. A. Robinson, of the colonial office, has been appointed secretary of the commission.

Mr. Harcourt defended the Government against the charge of dilatoriness in respect of the resolutions of the Imperial Conference, and enumerated a dozen matters which had been given effect to, including the modification of the Japanese treaty, the copyright act, the strengthening of the appeal court, and naturalization. The Government had succeeded in releasing the dominions from treaties with Mexico and Sweden. He hoped the labors of the trade commission would be concluded before the next imperial conference was held.

The Opposition are greatly disappointed over the personnel of the trade commission, and regard it as entirely partial. Men like Lord Grey and Lord Balfour, of Burleigh should have been asked, they say, and not men who are known to be extreme partisans.

ST. DAMASE, QUEBEC, WIPE OUT BY FIRE

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WIDOW LOSES CASE

No Claim for Insurance, Husband Not Being in Good Standing.

Montreal, April 3.—Mrs. William Walker, the widow of the Grand Trunk engineer, who was killed after he had given notice of his withdrawal from the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, lost the action which she brought against the union for her husband's insurance, on the ground that it was liable, because a bylaw preventing the payments of benefits to a man who had resigned was not printed upon the policy in accordance with the Quebec insurance act. The superior court held that the insurance legislation evoked was not in force at the time Walker was killed, and that the engineer, not being a member in good standing at the time of his death, the widow had no claim against the organization.

IS NICHOLS LYING?

Police Do Not Believe That He Murdered Dr. Helen Knabe.

Boston, April 3.—Police officials of Boston and Portsmouth, N. H., were more confident today that Seth Nichols' declaration that he murdered Dr. Helen Knabe, in Indianapolis for \$1,500 is an untruth. It has developed that Nichols has resided in this city, that his bride of six months died here a few weeks ago, and that he is wanted by the local police on a charge of burglary.

Seth's statement that he murdered Dr. Knabe is the product of a brain reeled by the death of his wife, said Nichols' sister-in-law, Mrs. Bella Lyons, of this city. "He worshiped my sister May, and as a matter of fact, deserted from the navy so he might be with her here. He is an Indianapolis boy, and I believe that he obtained his description of the crime from the newspapers of that city."

FOREIGNERS IN PERIL

English and American Families in Mexico Hurrying to Refuge.

Mexico City, April 2.—Three carloads of women and children, mostly English and Americans, who will depart for the United States, arrived here today from Pachuca. Only the women and children of foreign families have been sent out of Pachuca.

There have been no new developments in the railway strike of American locomotive engineers and conductors, fear of the effects of which is assigned as one of the main reasons for the recent increase in the departure of foreigners.

Passenger service on the Cuernavaca division of the national railways has been suspended. This line extends southward from the capital through the region infested by Zapatistas, and its trains frequently have been assaulted. The latest attack of this sort occurred last Saturday when several passengers and the military guards' train were killed in the mountains.

THINNESS HIS DISGUISE

Change a Fat, Jolly-Looking Embezzler Made in His Appearance.

London, April 4.—Lepreux, the absconding cashier of the Suez Canal Company, who disappeared from Paris in October after embezzling \$400,000, was arrested in a Turkish bath at Lille last Thursday.

Lepreux, a fat, jolly-looking man, conceived the idea that the best way to disguise himself would be to turn himself into a thin man. Accordingly, he went to Lille in November and set about his task.

Every day at 2 p.m. he arrived at the Turkish bath, and after passing through the various heat rooms was given elaborate massage. Then he drank a bottle of claret and went to sleep in the divan room until seven o'clock. As a result of this vigorous treatment in three and a half months he reduced his weight by forty-four pounds, and the change in his appearance was such that the detectives when they saw him were unable at first to recognize the comfortable, jolly cashier of the police photographs in this emaciated looking individual with sunken cheeks. His face was deeply furrowed. His erstwhile rotundity had vanished and a ragged gray beard had taken the place of his neat black moustache.

He declared that he had lost all the money he had stolen except \$12,000 in speculation.

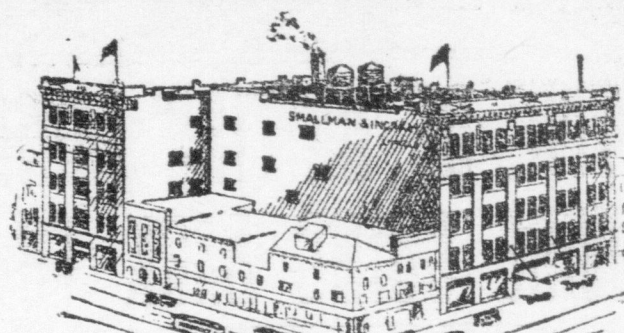
Lytellton, N. Z., April 3.—The Terra Nova, in which Capt. Scott went into the Antarctic, arrived here today and appeared undamaged.

PARIS WATER BRIGADE

New Police Corps a Result of Plunge of Auto "Bus Into the Seine.

Paris, April 3.—M. Lepine, prefect of police, has just formed a new corps, a diving brigade. This step is the outcome of the accident last September, when an auto "bus" mounted the sidewalk of a bridge over the Seine and crashed through the railing into the river.

The city council, recognizing the need of a special police force to search the river for any such accident, voted \$900 to buy diving apparatus and powerful lights for search-lights on board a boat. The Margotat, assigned for this service.

The brigade will be formed of five men chosen from the present river police, who will undergo a special training for the work. When an accident is reported in the river, the Margotat, which is a flat boat, will be towed by a steamer to the spot. The divers will put on their diving suits, and once they have arrived at the spot no time will be lost before making a descent.

BROKE INTO LIBRARY. Toronto, April 3.—The reference library on College street was entered by a burglar last night, but the booty he secured was not sufficient to reimburse him at union rates for the work he had to do. All he secured

was 75 cents in stamps and most of them were British and United States issues, and of no use in this country. In order to secure these he climbed an iron fence and bored a hole with an auger through the solid oak door leading to the office of the chief librarian. The time consumed must have been close upon two and a half hours. The police have no clue as to who the marauder is.

DEATHS FROM CONTAGION. Toronto, April 3.—Deaths from contagious diseases in Ontario during March were fewer than for the corresponding month in 1911. Last month the mortality list gives a total of 148, while the deaths for the corresponding month a year ago totalled 203.

A HYDRO-AEROPLANE. London, April 2.—A series of successful tests with a hydro-aeroplane which has been constructed for the British admiralty, were made yesterday at Harrow, under the auspices of Vickers, Sons & Maxim, builders of the craft.

After skimming across the Cavenish dock at a speed of 45 miles an hour, the hydro-aeroplane rose birdlike into the air, and alighted again. The feat was thrice accomplished successfully. As the wind increased further trials were postponed.

TERRIBLY INJURED BY FALL ON BUZZ SAW

A Young Englishman Slipped While at Work in Barrie Lumber Mill.

Barrie, April 3.—Almost cut in two by a swiftly-revolving wood-sawing machine, Abraham Pinion, a young unmarried Englishman, lies at the Royal Victoria Hospital here now fighting a brave struggle for his life, with chances for recovery. He was engaged with Andrew Cunningham operating a wood-sawing machine at the farm of Charles Parker, near Minessing, and when carrying a log on to the carriage, he fell across the saw, which cut deeply into his left chest and into the lung. Dr. Murphy, of Phelyston, who was in the neighborhood, was called, and he summoned Dr. W. A. Ross, of Barrie, in consultation several hours later. The injured man was taken to Minessing station, to be brought to Barrie, but a blockade on the line delayed the train, and the ten-mile journey was made over rough roads by sleigh. Grave fears were entertained by the doctors that pneumonia would set in, but Pinion has so far weathered this off, and hopes are now entertained for his recovery.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS ATTACKED BY PRIEST

Utterances of Father Doyan Stirred Up Order in Quebec.

Montreal, April 4.—A sensation has been caused among the Knights of Columbus by a sermon delivered the other day in St. Hyacinthe by Rev. R. P. Doyan, Father Doyan, after denouncing the Oddfellows, Knights of Pythias and the Macabees, said the Order of the Knights of Columbus exploited the people for political ends, while no dignified and intelligent man could go through its initiation. It is likely that a meeting of members of the Knights of Columbus of St. Hyacinthe and perhaps the Province of Quebec will be held to protest against Father Doyan's remarks.

WORKMEN WARNED BY CATHOLIC BISHOP

Church in Quebec Takes Action Against International Unions.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Montreal, April 3.—Concerted action is being taken by the Roman Catholic authorities in the Province of Quebec against international unions which have adopted neutrality in religious matters as part of their programme. Solemn warnings are being issued to workmen, pointing out that these unions are liable to encourage socialism and godlessness. Archbishop Bruchesi, of Montreal, made a statement along these lines a few days ago. Yesterday two Quebec prelates, the Bishop of Chicoutimi and the Bishop of Sherbrooke, made similar pronouncements on the subject. The former saw a real danger, from the Roman Catholic workmen of this country joining such unions as fraternizing freely with socialists and Masonic groups and do not hide their anti-clerical ideas. The Bishop of Sherbrooke denounced trade unions, and contended in an address that unions are the source of the present troubles in Great Britain, and that, instead of uniting the people, they separated them. His lordship's statement is said to be inspired by an attempt to form a carpenters' union at Sherbrooke.

BRIDE OF A WEEK KILLED BY BOARDER

Murderer Attempts To Take His Own Life With Razor.

[Canadian Press.]

Chicago, April 3.—Mrs. Emily Shaw, who was married only a week ago, was murdered today in her West Ohio street home by Clarence Carr, a boarder, who then tried to kill himself. He used a razor. According to the police, Carr, who has a wife and two children, was infatuated with Mrs. Shaw, and before committing the crime, wrote two notes saying that the home of the woman he killed was his until Shaw appeared. He asked that he be buried from Mrs. Shaw's home. Carr was taken to the county hospital. His condition is serious.

STORM IN NEW JERSEY.

Wilmington, Del., April 3.—The wind storm which swept over Philadelphia and a portion of New Jersey last night, did considerable damage in Delaware, killing one person and injuring several others.

Near Dagsboro, in Lower Sussex County, the wind demolished the house of Washington Hickman. William Hickman was killed almost instantly. His brother lost an eye and his father was badly injured. Clifford Sockler, a boarder at the Hickman home, sustained fractures of both legs. An infant asleep in bed escaped without a scratch.

A schooner, supposed to be the Humarock, from Charleston, S. C., for Philadelphia, was driven high on Cherry Island in the Delaware River, by the wind.

DYING FROM FAMINE. Shanghai, April 3.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, accompanied by Premier Tang Shao Yi, arrived here at 6 o'clock this evening, and was accorded an elaborate reception. A military guard of honor awaited the ex-premier's arrival, and a large gathering of officials were also present.

Dr. J. B. Woods, the foreign superintendent of the famine relief work, reports that 3,000 people are dying daily from hunger.

MONTREAL REFORMERS WIN BIG VICTORY

Godfrey, the Enemy of Grafters, Elected to the Board of Control.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Montreal, April 4.—The reform element in Montreal won a striking victory yesterday in the election to fill the vacancy on the board of control caused by the resignation of Mr. F. L. Wanklyn. Despite all efforts of the reactionaries and a determined effort to make the French-Canadians vote against any English candidate, the nominee of the Citizens' Association won by such a majority that every other candidate lost his \$200 deposit.

While there was a very small vote, it went so strongly for the reform candidate that in many subdivisions not a ballot was marked for anyone else.

The vote stood: C. H. Godfrey (reform candidate), 13,296; ex-Ald. Clearhue, 5,498; ex-Ald. N. Giroux, 4,228; and Mr. Guerin, 1,046.

Mr. Godfrey thus had a majority over the next highest candidate of 7,797, and a majority over all the other candidates combined of 2,528.

This is taken as a great victory for the reform movement, headed by the Citizens' Association, the board of trade, and La Chambre de Commerce, which had nominated Mr. Godfrey.

The net result of the election is regarded as a remarkable setback to the forces who have been for a long time trying to work against the board of control and the reform civic administration, and as such there is general satisfaction throughout the city.
