

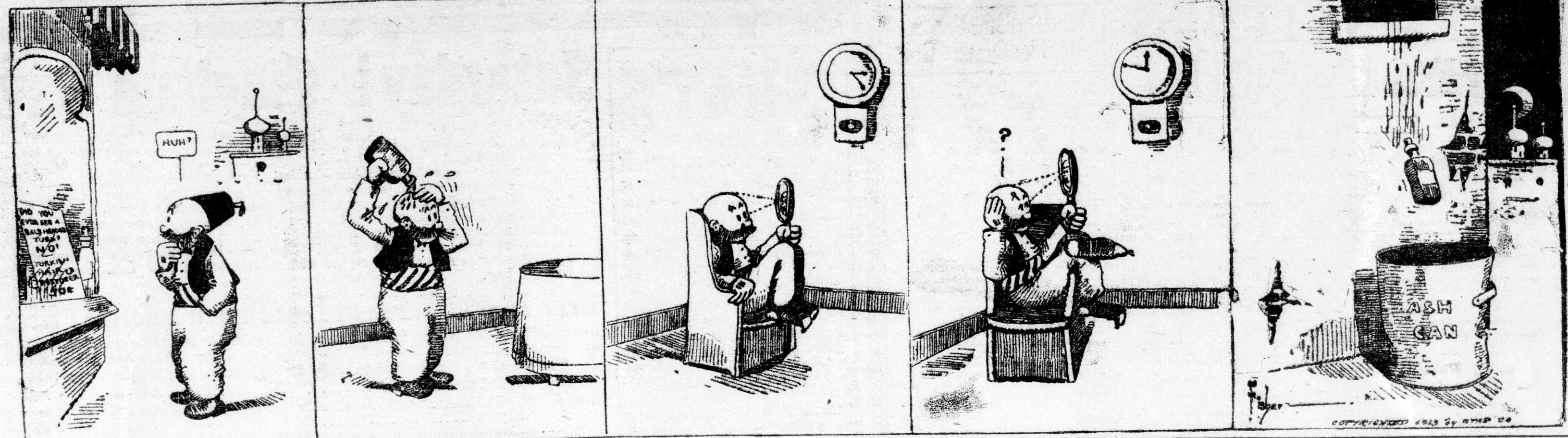

LONDON WILL MAKE 3 TRIPS TO OTTAWA

That Is if Frank Shaughnessy's Schedule for 1913 Is Adopted.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—If Shaughnessy's schedule, or the major portion of it, is adopted, the Ottawas will open their season at Brantford about May 7. Then they will move on to Hamilton for two days, and return here for five games. The Brantford team has been given the opening date here, which will be quite a plum in view of the celebrations which the Ottawa magnates are arranging. The teams will all come for three games instead of two, as in many cases last year. Hamilton, Grantford, Guelph, London and Peterboro will make three trips to Ottawa, while the others will be here twice. Shaughnessy's schedule reduces the mileage of all the clubs to a good extent, and would be hard to improve upon. Secretary Robinson has also arranged one, however, and there may be a fight over five allotment of dates. The big clubs—Ottawa, Brantford, London and Hamilton will get the majority of the holiday and Saturday dates, whichever way the schedule goes, as the teams always make it a point to play where they can pull out the crowds on the big dates. Double headers will be played each holiday.

RACING IN NEW YORK ALMOST ASSURED

According to Reports the Co-operative Plan Will Be Tried.

New York, Feb. 28.—It is published here as "an almost assured fact" that horse racing will be revived in New York next June for the first time since the anti-betting legislation of Gov. Charles Hughes' administration brought activity to a standstill. No announcement has come officially from the Jockey Club, which is the governing body of the racing association, or from the associations' representatives in sporting circles. These reports are that a co-operative plan will be tried, whereby the various associations will combine to share losses and profits alike until the sport has been firmly re-established. A subscription fund among the associations is prescribed as the initial move, and it is said that this proposal has already met with such favor that the opening of a few race courses is assured directly after the closing of the spring meetings in Maryland the latter part of May.

Four tracks are named for the circuit the present—the Belmont Park, Aqueduct and Yonkers tracks, in the immediate vicinity of the metropolis, and the old Saratoga track up-state.

The Jockey Club recently held a meeting to consider the situation as affected by a supreme court decision on an oral betting case, whereby the court held that the directors of the racing associations were not liable for oral betting within their inclosures. Another meeting of the Jockey Club is scheduled for the near future, when something official may be learned of the present reports.

St. Thomas, Feb. 28.—The Saints will have Fred Brown, of the Sharon Club of the Ohio and Pennsylvania League, covering the second sack this season. Brown had an application in with the club about a month ago, and since that time communications have been made and the result is that Brown has a contract in the hands of the St. Thomas club with his signature attached. Beside the script with his John Henry attached, Brown sent clippings from the Fulton, N. Y., papers giving his best games. In one against New Castle in four times at bat he made two double-sackers, the first of which brought in a tying score, seven assists, and no errors, and also sneaked a base.

Brown is a well-built youngster of about 20 summers, and plays second base and shortstop with equal facility.

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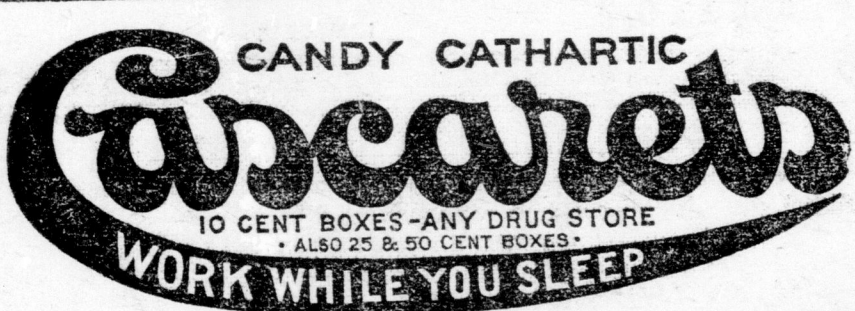

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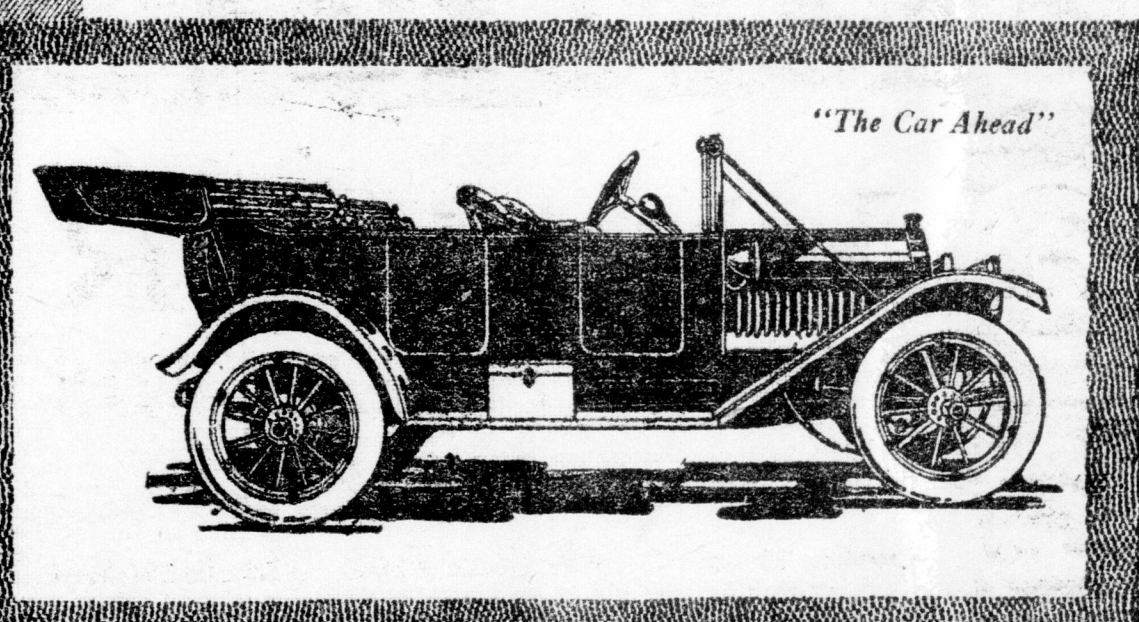
