Friedman Cure To Be Syndicated?

New York, March 31.—A proposal has been made to Dr. Friedman by an American syndicate for the purchase of the exclusive manufacture and sale rights of his tuberculosis cure. The terms of the proposal are as yet indefinite, and Dr. Friedman has not given any indication as to whether, when completed, they will be accepted or rejected.

The news of the desire of the drug syndicate to acquire the Friedman remedy for putting it on the market came today as the culmination of many secret conferences which are known to have occupied the attention of the Friedman party for the last several days.

That the syndicate was trying to obtain the exclusive rights of the culture was confirmed tonight by Dr. J. Jungmann, the third vice-president of the concern, and the man through whom negotiations have been made.

Exclusively handing over to the drug concern his secrets, Dr. Friedman, according to Dr. Jungmann, would grant to the company the perpetual right to manufacture and sell the preparation throughout the United States. Dr. Jungmann said that Dr. Friedman is unwilling to consider any offer that will not guarantee that a certain proportion of the preparation manufactured by the company will be turned over in some way to the public gratuitously for the use of the poor.

LONDON PAPER OFFERS \$50,000 FOR A FLIGHT ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

London, March 31.—Tomorrow's Daily Mail will announce the offer of a prize of \$50,000 to the first person who will fly from any point in the United States, Canada or Newfoundland to any point in Great Britain and Ireland, or vice versa, in 72 continuous hours, in a heavier-than-air machine. The machine must be so constructed as to float.

The Mail publishes an interview on the subject with Comte De Lambert, Wilbur Wright's first pupil, and the inventor of the hydroplane. Asked as to the possibility of a transatlantic flight, De Lambert said:

"I think it will be done before ten years have passed, and not only so, but I think it will be done between sunrise and sunset. As things are today, no machine could get across without stopping en route for fuel. Before doing so, we must find a better fuel than petrol, or a more efficient motor, or a machine which requires less than a 40-horsepower thrust, and I do not doubt that we shall succeed. Meanwhile, I consider the scheme of flying across the Atlantic with stoppages to be perfectly practicable. It is merely a question of luck and having two days of calm weather."

Pelletier's Big Lock Contract May Be Placed Under Probe

Forty Years' Supply at One Dollar a Piece and Postmaster-General Admits That There Were No Tenders Called.

Ottawa, March 31.—Three hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the purchase of locks and keys for mail bags is the contract entered into by Postmaster-General Pelletier, according to his statement in Parliament today in response to persistent questions by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux. The Postmaster-General has contracted with a recently-created Ottawa firm for 350,000 of these small locks and keys at \$1 each. It is significant that in the whole of Canada there are only 15,000 postoffices, including every hamlet and subsidiary office.

As a result of the report that the company which has been awarded this remarkable contract is composed of friends of the Postmaster-General, Mr. Lemieux brought the matter first to the attention of the House on Wednesday last, and asked who the firm was. Mr. Pelletier's reply, as officially reported in Hansard of that day, was as follows: "A firm in Ottawa, of which Mr. Carling is the manager." Proceeding, the Postmaster-General volunteered the following information: "They were the lowest tenders."

MR. PELLETIER ANNOUNCES PARCELS POST SYSTEM

Will Be Modeled on That of the United States—Also Has Bill for Imperial Cable.

Ottawa, March 31.—Postmaster-General Pelletier has given notice of two important bills which he will introduce on Wednesday next. One is entitled "An Act Relating to the Parcel Post." While details are not available it is understood that the proposed legislation will follow to some extent the recent United States parcel post legislation.

The other bill is intended to provide more advantageous telegraphic communication between Canada, the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire. The bill is the result of conferences and correspondence between Postmaster-Generals Samuels and Pelletier. It will provide a concurrent control of cable rates between Great Britain and Canada and will authorize it to be said, such action as the Canadian Government in connection with the Imperial Government may lead to a state-owned Atlantic cable.

It is not improbable that specific zones may be first selected in the more thickly settled districts for trying out the service, and these may be enlarged from time to time by departmental action as circumstances warrant, thus following out the line of development now obtaining in regard to rural mail delivery. At present, however, Mr. Pelletier says he is not in a position to definitely announce what plans will be followed.

Morgan Honored by Wall Street

Resolution Eulogizing Dead Financier Read From Rostrom.

[Canadian Press.] New York, March 31.—Business was suspended for five minutes on the stock exchange while the members adopted a resolution on Mr. Morgan's death. The resolution was read from the rostrum. It was the first time in its history that the exchange stopped work to pay honor to the manner. The resolution said in part:

"Resolved, that the death of J. Pierpont Morgan has removed from America's large creative activities its most conspicuously useful and successful figure. The development of the resources of our country, he has contributed more than any man of our day. His immense constructive genius was devoted not merely to American financial and industrial but to the wide field of philanthropy and humanity. The whole world has lost a wise counselor and a faithful friend."

Soon after Mr. Morgan's death was announced, Wall Street half-masted its flags, including the great flag that floats over the stock exchange.

ST. KITTS EDITOR ILL. St. Catharines, Ont., March 31.—Ald. William B. Burgoyne, editor and owner of the Standard, was taken suddenly ill last night and rushed to the hospital. He is troubled again by an old physical trouble, and his condition is critical. He recently conducted a strenuous campaign in connection with the viaduct scheme, and it is thought the strain proved too much for him.
