CIGARETTE LICENSES DEARER IN INGERSOLL

Commencing Today, Tax Upon
All Dealers Is Fifty Dollars
—Many to Stop Selling.

INGERSOLL, April 30.—Beginning tomorrow a fifty dollar license is necessary to sell cigarettes in Ingersoll. The bylaw fixing the license was passed by the council in March but the dealers have been given an opportunity to dispose of their stock in case they did not desire to take out a license. Up to the present cigarettes have been sold by probably fifteen dealers. Today Chief Fish has been collecting. In accordance with the provisions of the by-law, tonight three dealers had taken out licenses, and two more at least it is expected will do so in the morning. The town will therefore derive considerable revenue under the bylaw.

Many Improvements.
It is expected the tender for the improvements to the postoffice, which have been on the slate for some time, will be awarded shortly. Work of an extensive nature will be undertaken and there will be a large expenditure. The time for tendering for the work has expired and the blue prints have been sent back to Ottawa. During the time that the work is in progress the postoffice will be in the old Imperial bank building, which is centrally located and very suitable.

Repairing Streets.
Street work is now engaging the attention of the board of works. In different places holes are being filled in, especially near crossings, and other work done that will do much to improve their appearance. The changeable weather has done much to upset plans of anglers. Some of them had planned expeditions for speckled trout tomorrow, but the heavy rains and cold weather has caused them to postpone their trips.

FOUR ONTARIO MEN ON LOST STEAMER

Mate, Cook and Wheelman of the Noble Were From Niagara District.

ST. CATHARINES, April 30.—Several homes in St. Catharines and vicinity are mourning the loss of the steamer "Noble" on Lake Superior. George R. Longley, the mate, a short time ago, was a resident of St. Catharines, having been born here. He leaves a wife and five children.

William Shaver, aged 22 years, Chestnut street, St. Catharines, was wheelman on the Noble. From Detroit he wrote home stating that the boat was a hard one to handle, but he thought he could "hold her down."

Earl Crawford, aged 21 years, of Port Dalhousie, was cook. A letter was received from him at Detroit since he joined the steamer. It was his second season on the lakes.

John Murray, of St. Catharines, is also believed to have shipped on this boat.

AMERICAN SHOT IN LONDON

LONDON, April 30.—A man about 60 years old, who described himself as Major Henry C. Fitzgerald, an American, and believed to have been formerly paymaster on the staff of Gen. Merritt in the Philippines, was shot in the "Claring Cross Hotel today. He died from his wound after he had been conveyed to a hospital.

The police authorities are of the opinion that the man committed suicide.

TO HONOR COOK AS DISCOVERER OF POLE

Resolution Introduced in United States Congress.

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 30.—The North Pole discovery incident was revived in the Senate today by Senator Poindexter who introduced a joint resolution expressing the thanks of Congress to Frederick A. Cook for the discovery of the North Pole on April 21, 1908, and authorizing the Secretary of the Navy to present him with a \$300 medal.

Senator Poindexter declared it was generally accepted Dr. Cook had reached a point of high latitude and contended that it was unreasonable to suppose he had spent the winter in the frigid north without attempting to reach the goal of his search, the north pole. He contended Rear-Admiral Peary's report on his trip to the pole corroborated all Dr. Cook's data.

No action was taken on the resolution.

WIDE POWERS FOR CHINA'S PRESIDENT

Amended Constitution for the Republic To Be Promulgated Today.

PEKING, China, April 30.—The amended constitution for the Republic of China, which is to be formally promulgated tomorrow, is notable for the great powers it gives the president. The document as it now stands is the work of a constitutional convention, which has been laboring here since the middle of March.

The president is empowered to convene, open, suspend, close, and dissolve the legislature; submit to it the budget, as well as other bills, and refer back to the legislature for consideration bills already passed by it. If such measures are rejected by a three-fourths majority, the president may, with the consent of the administration, still withhold their promulgation.

The president is given sole power to appoint and dismiss civil and military officials; to declare war and conclude peace, and he will be in control of the army and navy, as well as of all expenditures for these branches of the Government.

SEEKS DISSOLUTION OF FAIRHOPE COLONY

Member Charges Monies Were Not Properly Expended.

MOBILE, Ala., April 30.—A bill was filed today in chancery court, seeking the dissolution of the Fairhope colony in Baldwin county, the principal experiment of the single tax theory in the United States.

Alexander J. Melville, a member and lessee of the corporation, has filed the bill. The bill alleges that the corporation has failed "because the single tax theory never can be carried out in any jurisdiction where laws deny the essentials of that theory."

The single tax colony was established eighteen years ago and then was populated largely by single tax pioneers from Iowa. A large tract of land on the eastern shore of Mobile Bay was purchased, the corporation paying all taxes to the state and levying on its members and lessee, only a single tax for land.

One of the leading single taxers interested in the colony was the late Joseph Fels, Philadelphia millionaire.

LORD MURRAY MADE ONLY "ERRORS OF JUDGMENT"

Nothing in This Conduct in Investing in Marconi Shares Reflecting Upon His Personal Honor.

LONDON, April 30.—The committee of the House of Lords appointed to investigate Lord Murray's dealings in American Marconi shares, today issued its report, which finds that he committed "errors of judgment." There was, however, nothing in his conduct "which reflects upon his personal honor."

The committee recommends "there should henceforth be an inflexible rule to preclude those who had any public office from entering upon an speculative transaction in stocks or shares under any circumstances whatever."

Lord Murray, when he was chief Liberal whip in the House of Commons, was said to have invested some of the funds of the Liberal party in Marconi shares.
