

ADDITIONAL PRIZE WINNERS AT GUELPH WINTER FAIR

GUELPH, Dec. 8.—There was a large attendance on the closing day of the Winter Fair. The judging of Clydes, imported and Canadian-bred, was the feature, and they brought out a fine showing. Grand championships were awarded in several classes.

The first class called was Clyde stallions, foaled prior to January, 1913, and had the largest entry of any class shown at the fair, 20 being entered and 17 appearing in the ring. They were a magnificent lot, but the judges had a hard time picking the winners: 1 Marathon, exhibited by T. H. Hazard, Markham; 2 Smith & Richardson, Columbus; 3 Gen. Sir H. M. TRIUMPH FOR ANGUS GRADES OF CATTLE

GUELPH, Dec. 8.—Some of the breeders who had not shipped all their stuff were putting in time around the vacant winter fair buildings today. The chief topic seemed to be an analysis of the winnings, and above all that everything had been perfectly level and above board. And perhaps the showing of the grades and crosses from the Angus line was the dominant tone of the afternoon gossip, and it certainly is worth considering.

The individual pure-bred classes in all the sections are called first, and the awards made. It is only after this that the real battles of the "class" begin. In the classes for grades or crosses of any breed, the test of the prepotency of the pure breed must lie—in these alone can be found the superiority which tells in the end for the producer, exhibitor and consumer. In these crosses there were about 70 entries and the results are worth noting.

Angus crosses won six firsts, besides champion and reserve champion and grand champion over all pure-breds, grades and crosses; four seconds, three thirds, four fourths, two fifths, one sixth, two sevenths, one eighth and five unplaced.

Crosses from other breeds, two firsts, four seconds, five thirds, two fourths, three fifths, three sixths, two sevenths, one eighth, fifteen unplaced.

So it must be concluded, whether it was a coincidence in the selection of exhibits or not, that the Angus grades and crosses were the outstanding cattle class of the entire show.

Dressed Carcase Sale.

A large number were present at the sale of carcasses, and it cannot be said the much-hated H. C. of L. was loitering around the premises, for the prices were moderate in nearly every case. Dressed butcher hogs averaged 14½ cents a pound. Dressed bacon hogs went a little better at 14½ cents. The buyers in nearly every case were local dealers.

Lambs were sold from 17 to 22 cents, and the average was around the 15-cent mark. Dressed mutton brought from 11 to 14 cents, and averaged 12½ cents. The best side of beef weighed 555 pounds, and brought only 13 cents per pound. This is the best that sold at the college sale a few weeks ago at 11 cents on the hoof, and it will be seen that the hoof sale was the more profitable. Another side of beef weighed 237 pounds, and was knocked down at 10 cents. A side of baby beef, 20 pounds, went a little higher and brought 14½ cents.

Two were brought in this year and about a year. The latter has a record of 10,000 pounds of milk and 840 pounds of butter as a 3-year-old. Col. Cockshutt is establishing a herd of these cattle.

RUSSIAN OPERATIONS AROUND BUCHAREST WILL HARRASS THE FOE

New Drive Started in the Carpathians.

UPSETS GERMAN PLANS

Teutons Are Unable To Break Through the Moldavian Line.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—A Reuter dispatch from Petrograd says:

"The Russian invalid, the military organ, in foreshadowing great military events in the direction of Bucharest, says that it is impossible to allow the enemy to settle in winter positions in central Rumania, and on the lower reaches of the Danube, which would be equivalent to submitting to his initiative and enabling the enemy to support himself on the rich supplies of the country for at least five months."

"Should the enemy succeed in fortifying himself between the Lower Danube and the Carpathians, the newspaper adds, he would not only be able to develop the operations around Salonki, but in the spring could hurl himself at the chief points of the Russian main front. The enemy is hastening to finish with the Balkans, prior to beginning extensive operations against Russia."

NEW OFFENSIVE IN CARPATHIANS STARTS.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 8, via London.—The Russians have taken the offensive in the wooded Carpathian district, and a battle is in progress there, the war office announced today.

The text of the statement reads: "Western front: On the Gornitsa-Peniat front the enemy bombarded our positions with mines of powerful destructive effect."

"In the region of Potuzi and Dela-

kelany rifle and artillery fire of great intensity is proceeding.

"In the wooded Carpathians our detachments have taken the offensive at the height five versus south of Javornik. The battle is continuing with the result not yet known."

"Eight versts northwest of Lorong Mountain our scouts attacked an enemy ambulance and dispersed it."

WALLACHIA RETREAT BEING CONTINUED.

"In Dobruja and on the Danube calm has prevailed."

TEUTONS SAY PURSUIT GAINING GROUND.

BERLIN, Dec. 8.—Via Saville.—Further progress has been made by Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces in their pursuit of the retreating Rumanians. It is officially announced this evening. The statement reads: "No incidents of importance have occurred on the western or eastern fronts."

"In Rumania the pursuit has gained ground."

ESCAPES BIG FINE BY JOINING RANKS

WINDSOR, Dec. 8.—George Duggan, aged 39, living on McNougal avenue, who came into the limelight through his connection with the case of the two O'Connor girls, found in a shack on Lillian avenue about a week ago, was allowed to go on suspended sentence on a charge of supplying liquor to soldiers. He had five bottles of whiskey on him when caught by the police. By enlisting Duggan escaped a fine of \$200 and costs, or three months in jail.

The other charge of contributing to the delinquency of the two O'Connor girls was not pressed, owing to the principal witnesses leaving the country.

COUNCIL OF KENT VOTES FOR DELAY ON ROADS SCHEME

January Session Must Decide—Economy Deemed Wise.

CHATHAM, Dec. 8.—This afternoon's session of the Kent County Council was given over entirely to the question of good roads and the consideration of a bylaw introduced on Tuesday providing for the remodelling of some 200 miles of roads connecting five centres, the improvements to be carried out under the highway improvement act, but the result of two and a half hours' debate left the question unsettled.

While all the members appeared to be heartily in favor of putting into force a good roads scheme, there was a division of opinion as to whether this was the proper time to make any improvements, in view of the war and existing conditions, and when a motion to leave the third reading of the bylaw over until the January session was put to the vote, it carried with a big majority.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—One of the commanders of the German forces invading Rumania, says a Reuter dispatch from Jassy, the new seat of the Rumanian Government, is a brother of King Ferdinand of Rumania. He has issued a proclamation to the people of the invaded territory, the dispatch adds, in which he says:

"Compose yourselves. Go on with your business. I have come to punish your felon of a king."
