Will Bury an Unknown Canadian Soldier in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.—The body of an unknown Canadian sol-dier is to be brought from the old western battlefront and buried beneath the Victory tower of the new parliament building.

It is proposed that the body shall be placed in a vault ex-cavated in the solid rock foundation under the great archway of the Victory tower, and between the two portals which give en-trance to the buildings. The grave will be set almost immediately below the altar in the memorial chamber overhead, and will be marked by a marble slab raised above the grave. This slab will be suitably inscribed.
