

ACCORD LARKIN WARM WELCOME

Members of Canada Club Tender Banquet To New Commissioner.

Sir Hamar Greenwood Presides At Reception in London.

LONDON, England, April 11 .- (By anadian Press Cable.)—Hon. Peter C. Larkin, the new high commissioner for Canada in London, was given a splendid reception at the Canada Club dinner here tonight. The dinner had been arranged as an occasion for the high commissioner to make his first public appearance in his official capacity, and it was a

Mr. Larkin was deeply touched by he good will and spontaneity of the greeting extended to him. Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, who was born at Whitby, Ont., very happily presided at the ban-His royal highness the Duke f York was one of the guests.

Sir Hamar Greenwood in proposng the health of Mr. Larkin, said that Right Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, ad asked him to express his sincere regret that he was unable to be present. Mr. Churchill, added the chairman, had already met the new nigh commissioner. Continuing, Sir Hamar said:

Hope For Irish Peace. "Mr. Larkin comes to London to speak for the Dominion of Canada in the councils of the British Commonwealth. Even in my time the position of high commissioner has, year by year, advanced in importance and power. It always strikes me that too much importance is perhaps attached to the representatives of foreign countries, and too little to the rep-

resentatives of the great dominions. "Mr. Larkin's presence here tonight makes me hope the time is not far distant when the Canada Club will welcome at their table the first high commissioner of the Free State of Ireland. The British government has made peace with Ireland; it is for

Irishmen to make peace in Ireland." Hon. Mr. Larkin, responding to the warm words of welcome from the chairman and hearty applause of the gathering, expressed his gratitude at the manner in which he had been re-He also took occasion to mention the pleasure it had given him to learn of the friendly feelings manifested by the Canadians resident in England upon hearing of his apnt as high commissioner.

Has Enviable Position. position of Canada after the world war might well be envied by ny other nation, Mr. Larkin said. Touching on the Canadian represen ation in London, the high commissioner said he was rejoiced to see so nany provincial agents-general working together here harmoniously What affected one province affected the whole Dominion, he added.

"We will not allow personal ambi-tions or any narrow sectional aims o obscure our view of what is going to be for the best interests of Canda as a whole," he said.

Speaking of the suggested new Dominion of Canada offices in London, the high commissioner said he might even take temporary headquarters that were more centrally located than the present offices. He referred to Canada's position in the following






