INSULIN BEING MADE FOR EXPORT

Toronto University Ships Diabetes Treatment To Nine Foreign Countries.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Toronto, Jan. 21.-C. H. Best, who was associated with Dr. F. G. Banting in the discovery of insulin as a cure for diabetes, announced this afternoon that production of insulin at the Toronto University laboratories s now far ahead of the local de-

mand.

"We are making twice as much as is being consumed," said Mr. Best, "We are sending it to eight or nine other countries now. That has been made possible by the provincial grant, "In this connection I want to thank the various city abattoirs for their supply of glands, free of cost during the early stages of the work, and at a low price at present, that is helping to lower the cost, which, I hope, will be still lower in the near future."




