Lavallee's Noble Melody, "O Canada" has found acceptance from Halifax to Vancouver. It belonged to Quebec, until two years ago. Then it became the possession of all Canada. The only thing Canada regrets is that the Champlain Tercentenary brought the tune to the front. No sooner was the dust brushed off these musicians, composers, and best of all, the great masses of the Canadian people recognized in it the grand simplicity which makes a national anthem. Earl Grey made it the fashion. Dr. Vogt handed it over to his Mendelssohn Choir and made it a classic. Bandmaster found in it a body of tone that lent itself to great effects with the brass and made it a stock piece. The school children all over Canada took it up, sang it, and made it popular in the home. Nowhere else in the world can a national anthem show such growth in two years time. Lieutenant Williams of the Grenadier Guards band says that "O Canada" is reminiscent of the "Scipio March". Perhaps, most national anthems are reminiscent of something or other some folk tone, some chord in the people's hearts. They would not become national anthems if they were not. Meanwhile, reminiscent or not, "O Canada" is good enough to keep. It goes everywhere. When Sir Wilfrid Laurier got

off the boat at Prince Rupert, just one step from the Arctic Circle, the band played "O Canada."—The Canadian Colliers.

## False Friends Left Him.

Sioux Lookout, Ont., Oct. 1.—George Ford has come back to civilization after being marooned on an island in Lac Seul for 63 days.

He had a terrible experience, and his nervous system is still in bad shape. He came up from Duluth to respect the trap along the English River, but was deserted by his companions, who took his boat, both guns, all his valuables and a large share of the provisions.

Ford did his best to attract the attention of the Hudson Bay Co. steamer which passed occasionally, but was foiled many times. He finally changed the location of his camp and lighted a huge bonfire. The steamer bore down on his improvised home and rescued him. The police are looking for the false friends who deserted him.

## Fugitive From Russian Douma.

Winnipeg, Oct. 1.—Longinus Theodor Gerus, fugitive member of the Russian Douma, has arrived here from Chicago to give evidence on the extradition of Savva Fedorenko, whose extradition is sought by the Russian Government.

Gerus was one of 55 members of the Douma who were indicted and one of nine who escaped. He was pursued across country for several months, but finally made his way out with the assistance of a forged passport. Interest in the Fedorenko case is increasing on account of the prominent refugees who are fighting to have the prisoner released.

## Lieut. Gzowski Buried.

London, Oct. 1.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—At Aldershot yesterday several thousand spectators witnessed the funeral of Lieut. Gzowski in the military cemetery. The interment was of the most impressive character. The Burials to which the Queen's Own was affiliated during their stay, furnished a firing party. The band and drums of the battalion followed. Among the chief mourners were Lord Strathcona and about 100 officers, with a detachment from nearly all the corps in camp.

## G.T.R. Engineers Get Increase.
