DALHOUSIE TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

Council Getting Down to Work and Good Results Are Looked For.

Dalhousie, May 13.—The regular meeting of the Dalhousie Town Council was held on Wednesday evening, May 13th. The Mayor and all aldermen except Alderman Barbour, present.
The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted and a few small accounts passed.
The Council authorized the Roads and Streets Committee to get estimates of permanent side-walks.
May 20th, was appointed Clean Up Day.

A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P. spoke briefly before the Council explaining bill authorizing the issuing of debentures for \$5000 to build permanent side-walks. Also spoke of housing problem and steam ferry service at Dalhousie.

A long resolution moved by Alderman Delaney, seconded by Alderman McNeil re Tourist Convention, tabled in the appointment of a strong committee, which will meet in the Dalhousie Chambers on Monday night to consider ways and means to make the convention a complete success. The committee will consist of the following: C. H. LaBelle, Chairman; Harry McEvoy, I. B. Deacon, Adam Bugeault, D. G. Stewart, E. R. Gaudet, Murray McKay, S. L. T. Clifford, Chas. Capt. W. A. R. Cragg, D. McDonald, As. Barthe, S. Blanchard, W. A. Gallop, Andrew Loggie, Dr. A. G. Ferguson, T. G. Scott and Frank Barberie.

MORE SALARY INCREASES ASKED

Town Employees Want More Pay—Other Matters Attended to.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's Office last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Couns. Bissett, Ingram, Dickie, Jamieson, Bellefleur. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
The Clerk read a communication from Hon. Robt. Murray asking the town's intention, re the balance of the amount apportioned to the Town under the Housing Scheme. Other towns were asking for increased amounts. The Clerk was instructed to write the Provincial Sec-Treas. that the Town required the full amount.

A letter from Premier Foster was read. This stated that an increase of \$500 had been authorized for loans under the Housing Scheme.

Frank Dolman and John Nelson firemen at Electric Light Station are applying for an increase of pay. Referred to Electric Light Committee.
Wm. Savidant, Commissioner of Public Charities asks for an increase of \$5.00 per month. Referred to Public Charities Committee.

Chief of Police Adams asks for another policeman for the summer months. Referred to Police and License Committee.

A number of applications for trucking were read and referred to the Police and License Committee.
The usual departmental accounts were ordered paid.
An informal talk took place in reference to various town services and His Worship remarked that "this is where a town manager would come in. Some one to see that the work is properly done and the orders of the Council carried out."

DRIVES ARE COMING WELL

Big Freshet Now and Logs Running Freely—Some Damage.

The heavy rain of last Saturday night and Sunday made a very high freshet on all branches of the Restigouche and other brooks and river, and stream driving, which had been practically at a standstill for lack of water commenced in earnest, and good progress is being made, the logs running freely.

It is said that water in the main river and branches rose six feet in a few hours and in some cases overflowed the banks doing some damage. At Christopher Brook the new diversion was damaged, about fifty feet of the roadbed being washed away and Monday trains delayed. Repairs have been made and traffic resumed.

BRICK CAMPAIGN NOW UNDER WAY

Another Means to Raise Funds For Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Work.

The Trustees of the Restigouche and Bay Chaleur Soldiers' Memorial Hospital wish to announce they are launching a Brick Campaign with an objective of \$15,000 to pay for the brick to be used in the building. The approximate cost of laying a brick in the building is five cents. COMMUTATION FARES HAVE ADVANCED

Increase on All Canadian Railway Lines Dates From May 1st.
Effective May 1st Commutation Fares have advanced on all Canadian Railways, and patrons of the Canadian National Railways have been advised that ten trip tickets purchased prior to May 1st will not be honored, but should be handed in to the nearest ticket agent, so that refund of the portions may be obtained.

Patrons are also advised that this increase in Commutation Fares applies to ten trip, fifty trip and scholars forty trip tickets. Ten trip tickets are limited to three months, instead of one year as heretofore, while regular fifty trip and scholars forty trip tickets are limited to one month. All who are holding these tickets purchased prior to May 1st should at once put them in line for redemption, either to the nearest Ticket Agent, or to the General Passenger Department, Moncton—May 5-2-wks.

CLEAN UP DAY IS FRIDAY

Everybody Get Busy and Make Campbellton a Cleaner Place to Live In.

To-morrow, Friday, May 14th has been proclaimed Clean Up Day by the Town Council, and it is hoped the citizens generally will get busy and make a good job of cleaning up Campbellton. There are many vacant lots along the front street which should be improved in some way, and all rubbish removed.

The following is the official notice in reference to Clean Up Day.

FRIDAY, 14th INST., has been appointed by the Town Council as a general "Clean-up-Day" for Campbellton, and it is particularly requested that all our towns people take special pride in having their premises cleaned up and all refuse material removed.

As one day may be too short a time in which to do the work required, Saturday may be included, when school children will be free to help. Never mind your play on those two days boys. Get busy. Help your parents to improve the appearance of your surroundings.

Persons not having teams had better make early arrangements with truckmen to avoid disappointment.

Town teams and men will be busy cleaning up the streets. The Town Clerk will give instructions regarding the disposal of all refuse material, including garbage, tin cans, iron hoops, wire and other waste material. Call him up by phone or see him personally.

Ashes will be hauled away by the Town teams free of charge if so desired. Notify the Town Clerk or Street Commissioner.

Empty medicine bottles, if good, should not be dumped. Let the boys wash them thoroughly and make pocket money for themselves by selling them to the Doctors or Druggists, who are always willing to pay a good price for them. "Waste not, want not." Encourage thrift. Get busy.

DELEGATION HAS GOOD HEARING

Feel Confident that Good Results Will Come From Visit to Ottawa.

The delegation from the Campbellton Board of Trade which last week proceeded to Ottawa to interview Acting Premier Sir Geo. E. Foster and Acting Minister of Public Works Hon. Dr. Reid have returned.

A special meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held last evening to hear this report.

Mr. W. D. Duncan, chairman of the Committee made a verbal report which upon the whole was very encouraging. The delegation, which was composed of Messrs. W. D. Duncan, W. H. Miller and D. A. Stewart were fortunate in arranging a meeting with Sir George Foster and Hon. Dr. Reid Friday afternoon and set the bridge matter fully before them.

While it was impossible for the government to pledge to undertake this work this year on account of the present financial conditions the necessity for the work was fully acknowledged and the promise given that the Dominion government would assist in the work and the appropriation necessary would be made just as soon as any new work was undertaken.

The other members of the delegation also reported and they were unanimous in expressing the opinion that everything looked very favorable to the erecting of the bridge.

LOCAL MILLS ABOUT READY

Some Have Commenced Operations and Others Will Start Soon.

The lumber mills along the Restigouche have commenced operations or will do so in a few days and the season bids fair to be the busiest ever experienced on the North Shore. With the addition of the two Fraser Mills, which are nearing completion, and will be saving early in July, a very large lumber cut is anticipated.

The two mills of the Richards Fig. Co., at Richardsville are running. One commenced Monday and the other Tuesday.

The W. H. Miller Co's shingle mill has commenced operations and the long lumber mill will be ready in a few days.

The Shives Lumber Co's big mill at Athol and the shingle mill here will be running as soon as logs are available.

The Chaleur Bay mills will also be running shortly.

MR. CHAS. ROBINSON CONTINUES IN OFFICE

The continuance of the office of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission under Charles Robinson, secretary, is an announcement which is received with general satisfaction by the returned men. They regard it as especially important to have such an institution still kept up in St. John now that the employment offices and the pensions offices have been closed, for there is still much work to be done towards helping needy or problem cases.
