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THE BOUNDARY AWARD.

Likely to be Settled out of Court and Ontario get her Due.

A gentleman from Ottawa, well informed in politics and a conservative, says Sir John has made a mistake in his attitude on the boundary question. But he says he was forced into it by the "blues" of Quebec. The means by which Sir John will release himself is to get the boundary question in as an issue between Ontario and Manitoba and then bring pressure on Norway the premier of Manitoba, to give in to Ontario.
