During the meeting the secretary of the plasterers union announced that applications had been received from Kingston, Ont., and St. Louis, Mo., for plasterers, and added that he thought in a very short time there would be no strikers left in Toronto. Coupled with this he said the cooperative plasterers would begin to work on their own account to morrow. wn account to-morrow.

A Ten Thousand Dollar Fire in the Print
