Police Court Pointers.

After the drunks and vags had been disposed of yesterday, Matt. Carpenter was brought up on a charge of having burglarized the house of John Smith, Bathurst street, and remanded.

Wm. Murray, till tapping, remanded. Michael Levi, larceny of an overcoat from S. Hamill, sent to the penitentiary for two years.

John Thackeray charged with trespassing on Jno. Thackeray's property, remanded.

Mrs. Johnson, Elm street. Wm. McPherson, Peter G. Harris and Charles Anderson were fined for trespassing on Mrs. Johnson's property.

Charles Erb, a whisky importer, was committed for trial on a charge of perjury.

A Young Watch Snatcher.

Yesterday morning two youths named Frank Phillips and Louis Witowski met in Purse's saloon on Adelaide street.

Phillips wore a watch which the other asked to see. Witowski examined it for a moment, wrenched it off the chain and made out of the door.

The Legislative Committee.

A special committee, with Mr. Fraser in the chair, met to consider Mr. White's bill to amend the act to give mortgages certain powers now commonly inserted in mortgages.

No conclusion was arrived at, and the committee will sit again.

The private bills committee reported a bill making valid bylaws of the water and Kingston exempting from taxation for ten years the premises of the Montreal transportation company and the Kingston and Montreal forwarding company.

The bill respecting the Napanee river improvement company was reported to the house with several amendments.

The railway committee reported to the house the bill to incorporate the St. Catharines and Niagara Central railway.

The bill authorizing the work of the railway company to issue new debentures and withdraw their former debentures was also reported to the house.

V. M. C. A. Anniversary.

The sittings of the district conference of the Y. M. C. A. for western Ontario were continued yesterday.

Mr. A. Munro of Troy, N. Y., occupied the chair. Messrs. Ingersoll, Cole and Tapscott of Brantford, Mr. Craig of Port Hope, and Mr. Longdale of Hamilton delivered addresses, in which they urged that the work of the association should be exclusively for young men.

Mr. Cole said that young men who brought girls with them did not appear to be influenced as much as those who were alone and untrammelled.

The twentieth anniversary of the association occurred yesterday, when thanksgiving services were held.

One Face for a Harness Shop.

Charles Smedley, a Swiss, has for a long time past kept a suspicious harness shop at 153 Bay street.

The suspicious part consisted in the fact that in rear of the shop girls of loose morals congregated.

Yesterday a man named Angus Macdonald and a companion went there and Macdonald claims that he was robbed of \$150 in money.

Detective Higgins investigated the matter and arrested Liza Gowan, an Annie Palmer as the thieves. Smedley was also taken in charge for keeping a disorderly house.

None of the money has yet been recovered.

The Osgood Public Debate.

The Osgood literary and legal society held a public meeting in Osgood hall last night.

Goldwin Smith occupied the chair. Mr. W. G. Thurston gave a reading, and Mr. J. M. Clark read an essay on "Minority representation." A debate followed on the subject, "Resolved that the liberty of the press has degenerated into license."

Messrs. G. Bolster and O. M. Arnold spoke in the affirmative, and Messrs. A. M. Taylor and D. T. Symons followed for the negative. The subject was ably argued, and Mr. Smith on summing up reviewed it at great length. He admitted that while many papers abused their license, the weight of argument was with the negative.

Freights on Milk.

The Grand Trunk company has reduced the freight charges on milk shipped to Toronto on the Great Western division.

The rate is reduced 2 cents, and is now 12 cents on each can of milk coming from any station as far west as Burlington.
