

DEBATE OF THE PARLIAMENTARY GOVERNMENT ON THE ADDRESS.

Mr. Collins' Amendment Carries and the House Adjourns Until Thursday—
LONDON, Jan. 26.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach gave notice in the house of commons that after the session would be introduced on Thursday a bill to suppress the Irish National League and other dangerous societies, to prevent intimidation, protect life and property and maintain public order in Ireland. [Loud cheers.] Sir Michael said he would ask the house to give the measure precedence. He added that this measure should be followed by a bill dealing with the Irish land question on the lines of policy indicated by the land purchase act of last year. Sir Michael said he would introduce a bill on the subject of the government's right to act in the case of the British North Borneo Company. The measure will be introduced by the house of lords. The matter was strongly supported by Sir Michael and Mr. Parsons later withdrew it.

THE SCOTT ACT AT ST. THOMAS.

Argument Against Its Enforcement Heard by the Minister of Justice.
OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—Messrs. Colin McLeod and T. W. Crothers, of St. Thomas, who appeared before the Hon. Mr. Thompson, minister of justice, and argued a petition protesting against the enforcement of the Canada temperance act in the city of St. Thomas, where the petition was carried by 11 majority. Mr. McLeod acted in behalf of petitioners, and Mr. Crothers for the Scott act supporters. The petitioners demanded a thorough enquiry, which was refused by the minister. He said he had no power to suspend the act, but would refer the matter to the highest authority. It is expected that the minister will report on the case to his cabinet to-morrow.
