Accompanying the address was a handsome silver water pitcher. The members at 8 o'clock left the De La Salle Institute and proceeded to the residence of Father O'Reilly in Leaside, where the presentation was made. Father O'Reilly made an appropriate reply.

MUSEUM SCHEME LAUNCHED.

Canadian Institute and Ontario Government specialists Will be Turned Over. The Public Library Board held a largely attended meeting yesterday afternoon. Those present were: A. H. Bowell, Q.C., Dr. Cassidy, John Hughes, William Mars, Edwin F. Pearson, Dr. R. A. Pyne and D. A. O'Sullivan, L.L.D., Q.C. The only two members absent were Mayor Clarke and John Taylor.

The chairman of the Finance Committee, J. J. Cassidy, presented a report recommending the passage of an act to the amount of \$100,000. The report also proposed the retention of a building for the purpose of the board on Oct. 9 last re the inventors and Patents' Association. The recommendations were adopted in their entirety. The Library Committee, of whom D. A. O'Sullivan is chairman, presented a report submitting a list of 324 new books which it was recommended to purchase at a cost of \$200. It was also recommended that the Copp-Clark Company's contract for binding year the committee had secured three tenders for the continuance of the work, of which Brown Bros. was the lowest; and it was recommended that this one should be accepted. The report was adopted.

A letter was read from David Boyle, 315 B. St. East, Toronto, in reference to about 500 specimens of gold, silver, lead, copper, iron and marble which had been entrusted to him by the British Columbia Government. The letter was referred to the Museum Committee. A. R. Bowell, Q.C., chairman of the Museum Committee, presented a report stating that in pursuance of the board's resolve to establish a public museum, conferences had been held by the committee with the Hon. Minister of Education and the Council of the Canadian Institute, looking to the acquisition of certain collections specified by the board. The third clause of the report dealt with the matter of providing suitable space in the library building for the reception of a museum, and it was said that the committee had availed themselves of the services of W. G. Storm and Devereux & King, architects, in considering the matter. If the museum hall, rooming and entrance vestibule were fixed up at a very reasonable cost, as they should be, ample accommodation would be secured. The report was concluded by the submission of the plan for the necessary alterations to the committee. The committee authorized to have the specifications prepared and tenders obtained in three parts, viz. for the vestibule and stairs, for the entrance hall and for the museum hall. When a vote was taken on the adoption of this report Dr. Cassidy was the only dissenting member. He did not believe in providing storage for Canadian Institute "rods" and Ontario Government "stuff" which the board did not know what to do with. The report, however, was adopted.

COUNCIL LEGISLATORS.

Work Councilors Watching the Interests of Their Constituents.

Very little was done by the York Council yesterday. The committee of visitors to the Industrial Home was abolished in spite of the opposition of Messrs. Humberstone, Fugley and Wood. The county's interests in the institution will be watched in future by the two commissioners. There has been some difficulty between the commissioners and the council, which has also led to a split in the council, one party wishing to retain the discharged and the other fighting to retain his services. Mr. Brown will move to today that the Committee on Bylaws be instructed to prepare a bylaw appointing a new keeper and master for the institution.

A bylaw was passed by the council confirming the action of the township council of Etobicoke in closing the road allowance between lots A and B in the broken front concession.

According to Mr. Woodcock's notice of motion yesterday the council passed a bylaw petitioning the Legislature to amend the Highway Act as to give their auditors unconditional right to audit the accounts of fees received by registrars. The council instructed the Bylaw and Legislative Committee to petition the Legislature for an amendment in section 7, Cap. 24, Vol. 2, so that the auditors of the court judges holding writs in municipalities outside the county should be left to the discretion of the judges, and that in the event of the dismissal of the appeal the judge be empowered to apportion costs between the applicant and the corporation.

At the afternoon session a bylaw of Elmer's a trustee of Markham High School in the stead of Mr. Hugh Clark, deceased. The report of the County Property Committee was received and the council went into committee of the whole to consider it. The first clause recommending the payment of the debt of \$100,000 to the City of Toronto was passed. The second clause recommending the granting of the request of the Mimico and Lake Shore Electric Railway. This company act that the plan of their route be changed so as to allow them to cross the Grand Trunk at the corner of Queen-street and Sunbury-street, and as near a right angle as possible and that they be allowed to extend their track as far as the subway, and that the council have the right to grant that permission. The council believe that they have the right, as the street is a public one, but is held by Parkdale since a 50-year lease. No decision could be taken when the council rose.

DOES ONE HONOR GUNNERY.

But They Favor Availing Woman With the Franchise.

"The time has come when every woman should enter her solemn protest against the military tendency of the times, especially in our public schools, with their wooden guns and foolishness." So said the Committee on Franchise, Legislation and Petitions of the Toronto Division, Women's Christian Temperance Union, after they had settled down to business in their cozy parlors, corner of Elm and Teraulay-streets, yesterday afternoon. This committee is formed of delegates from the different Toronto divisions of the W. C. T. U. Their work is to look into municipal government and to study and practice parliamentary rules. They want to obtain the ballot for women. Women as well as men, say they, should have this peaceful means of expressing their opinion on questions which concern and should include the whole of humanity.

The burning desire of the committee is to get women on the Public School Board. They wanted eloquent on this subject yesterday, and passed a resolution appealing to the women of Toronto to use their vote and influence to place on the board at least one woman from each of the six divisions of the city. It was stated that for the past 20 years the election of women to school boards and other municipal bodies by popular vote had been very common in the cities and towns of Great Britain.

At present, school trustees and men in other public positions will be watched and commented on by this committee. The consideration of the majority candidate was postponed pending further developments.

BOAT ON THE OTHER LEG.

Superintendent Hamilton Figures Out That McNamee Owe the City \$24,000.

The sub-committee appointed by the Waterworks Committee to consider the dispute with Mr. McNamee over the payment of the contract accounts met yesterday morning. Superintendent Hamilton presented a report showing that the contractor for the waterworks, on account of delays in completing the work, liable to the city for \$24,000. The amount Mr. McNamee claims is \$2000, so that, if Mr. Hamilton's claim is sustained Mr. McNamee will be debtor for \$22,000.
