## MR. JARVIS WILL MAKE STATEMENT

Cabinet Ministers and Business Men Invited to Meeting

TO OUTLINE NEW EVIDENCE

Meeting At Queen's Park Relates to Ontario Prosecutions

TORONTO, Dec. 29. — (Canadian Press Dispatch.)—The Toronto Star to-day says:

"Considerable interest attaches to a meeting which has been called for to-morrow at Queen's Park, at which Amedeus Jarvis, esq., will make a statement before Premier Ferguson, Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general, and a representative number of Toronto business men. It is also understood that representatives of the Dominion Government and the Conservative opposition at Ottawa may be present. "Since the acquittal of Andrew Papell, Mr. Jarvis and a number of his friends have felt that his fine should be remitted. One suggestion was that Mr. Jarvis should take action for recovery of the fine which he paid, but this he decided not to do. Mr. Jarvis has now arranged to-morrow's meeting and has extended a personal invitation to a large number of outstanding bankers, brokers, lawyers and other prominent Toronto citizens. He says he hopes to be able to outline certain new evidence which has hitherto been unavailable. "It is also said that negotiations have taken place between Mr. Jarvis' friends and the Conservative party, both in Ottawa and Toronto, to guard against possible criticism by the Tory opposition in Ottawa should Premier King's Government decide to take any action in Mr. Jarvis' case. "A large number of those invited have promised to be present at to-morrow's meeting, it is said, and the meeting will undoubtedly be one of the most interesting which has been held in Queen's Park for many a long day."

In the original trial before Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, in which Jarvis and Peter Smith, former provincial treasurer of Ontario, were found guilty of having defrauded the province, Jarvis was sentenced to the jail farm for six months and Smith to the penitentiary for three years. A fine of \$800,000 was also imposed on the pair. On behalf of Jarvis the fine was appealed. Jarvis, before judgment, however, paid into the province \$140,000. The verdict of the appeal court was that he should pay a fine of \$80,000 in addition to the \$140,000 already paid. The \$140,000, Jarvis claimed, was his total profit on the transactions from which arose the criminal charges both against himself and Mr. Smith. The meeting which The Star states is to be held to-morrow is regarding the \$200,000 paid to the province. Mr. Jarvis served his six months in jail. Mr. Smith is still in the penitentiary.

BRITISH PASSENGER BOAT SENDS CALLS FOR AID

The Coronado, Bound From Avonmouth For Jamaica With Sixty Passengers, Sends Messages

LONDON, Dec. 29. — A Lloyd's dispatch from London's end, the westernmost headland of England, reports S. O. S. messages from the British steamer Coronado, bound from Avonmouth for Jamaica. The Coronado carries 60 passengers, including the Bishop of Jamaica, Lord and Lady Inverchapel and Sir Archibald and Lady Edmonstone.

## WOULD-BE SUICIDE IS SUSPECTED OF MURDER

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. — Harry Cowan, who describes himself as "just a bad boy" despite his 54 years, lies seriously wounded in a Brooklyn hospital to-day, faced with the wreck of his life. Last night he was found but a few feet from the body of a attractive young stenographer, Miss Edith Burton, whom he killed before he attempted suicide in her Brooklyn home. The man who crumpled under a Christmas tree with three bullets in his body, a victim, police believe, of Cowan's anger when she refused his suit. Mrs. Ada Burton, mother of the slain girl, who found the victim of the tragedy, said that Cowan, who also was known to her as Arthur Rogers, had long been an attentive caller on her daughter.

## LOSS \$100,000 BY FIRE AT OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND

OCEAN CITY, Md., Dec. 29.—Fire which swept this summer resort city to-day, with a tentatively estimated loss of \$100,000, was brought under control late this afternoon when a shifting wind carried the flames seaward. The Atlantic and Seaside hotels, the city power plant, where the fire is believed to have started, and the greater part of the resort amusement section stood in ruins. The Atlantic pier, in the path of the flames as they turned oceanward, also fell. The residence section escaped serious damage, although roof fires started in a score of places from wind-carried embers. No casualties are known.

FIRE AT NORFOLK  
NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 29.—Several small stores in the business section of Norfolk were destroyed by fire this morning, with an estimated property damage of \$50,000, while in another section of the city seven persons were rescued by firemen from the roof of a three-story apartment when escape was blocked by the flames.
