Cabinet Ministers and Business Men Invited to Meeting

TO OUTLINE NEW EVIDENCE

Meeting At Queen's Park Relates to Ontario Prosecutions

TORONTO, Dec. 29. - (Canadian Press Dispatch.)-The Toronto Star

"Considerable interest attaches to a meeting which has been called for tomorrow at Queen's Park, at which Aemelius Jarvis, sr., will make a statement before Premier Ferguson, Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general, and a representative number of Toronto business men. It is also understood that representatives of the Dominion Government and the Conservative opposition at Ottawa may be present.

"Since the acquittal of Andrew Penall, Mr. Jarvis and a number of his friends have felt that his fine should be remitted. One suggestion was that Mr. Jarvis should take action for recovery of the fine which he paid, but this he decided not to do. Mr. Jarvis has now arranged to-morrow's meeting and has extended a personal invitation to a large number of outstanding bankers, brokers, lawyers and other prominent Toronto citizens. He says he hopes to be able to outline certain new evidence which has hitherto been unavailable.

"It is also said that negotiations have taken place between Mr. Jarvis' friends and the Conservative party. both in Ottawa and Toronto, to guard against possible criticism by the Tory pposition in Ottawa should Premier King's Government decide to take any action in Mr. Jarvis' case.

"A large number of those invited have promised to be present at tomorrow's meeting, it is said, and the meeting will undoubtedly be one of the most interesting which has been held in Queen's Park for many a long day."

In the original trial before Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, in which Jarvis and Peter Smith, former provincial treasurer of Ontario, were found guilty of having defrauded the province, Jarvis was sentenced to the jail farm for six months and Smith to the penitentiary for three years. A fine of \$600,000 was also imposed on the pair. On behalf of Jarvis the fine was appealed. Jarvis, before judgment, however, paid into the province \$140,000. The verdict of the appeal court was that he should pay a fine of \$60,000 in addition to the \$140,000 already paid. The \$140,000, Jarvis claimed, was his total profit on the transactions from which arose the criminal charges both against himself and Mr. Smith. The meeting which The Star states is to be held to-morrow is regarding the \$200,000 paid to the province. Mr. Jarvis served his six months in jail. Mr. Smith is still in the penitentlary.
