A Letter from Pte. James McClung

The following extracts from letters received by Mrs. McClung of Watford, from her son James, who was wounded a short time ago will be found of interest to our readers:—
Town Hall Military Hospital, Wallacy, Cheshire, England August 30th, 1918.

Dear Mother:— Just a few lines to let you know I am getting along alright. Say, mother, it is just great to get into a good bed again and to get a good rest. This is a good hospital, they treat us fine, in fact are too good to us. I will be spoiled when I get out. This place is just across the river from Liverpool and is a very nice place. Frank Wiley from Watford was wounded in the push and some of the 149 boys were killed, but you don't know any of them.
Under the date of Sept. 3rd, Pte McClung writes:—
I am doing well. I was out yesterday. I took the street cars to New Brighton. It is a very nice place on the sands at the mouth of the river Mersey. I intend to go across to Liverpool to-day. Will send you some post cards. Here we can see ships coming in from Canada and the United States every day. At the front the Canadians have pushed still further. The tanks make the Germans run. I have seen the Germans lying dead all over the ground with their shoes off. We took a lot of prisoners and every one of them had a loaf of bread with him. It is black such as I would not care to eat, but some of our boys say it is not too bad, so you see they are not starving yet. They say the war will soon be over. I expect to be in France again after Christmas.
