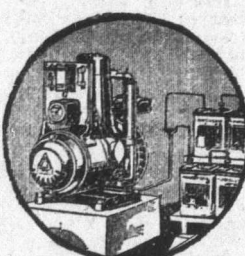
At a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Thomas Kelly in Petrolia Wednesday, Victor Bick was committed to the county jail at Sarnia to await trial before County Judge Albert E. Taylor, on a charge of drawing a revolver and threatening to kill Florent D'Hoey in the township of Enniskillen on August 16th. D'Hoey is the complainant in the case.

Throughout Oxford county the sow thistle, one of the most noxious weed pests of the age, is gaining an alarming foothold in practically all the townships. This weed has a yellow flower, somewhat resembling the dandelion, and the stalk and foliage are something like the Scotch thistle. It grows with alarming rapidity and is most prolific in both seed and root.

Annie McNeil, wife of Alex. McNeil, passed away at her home in Glencoe on Friday last, after a prolonged illness, in her 65th year. Mrs. McNeil was a daughter of the late John Walker, of Metcalfe, and was highly esteemed by a large circle of relatives and friends. Besides her husband she leaves two sons, Gordon McNeil, of Burk's Falls, and Archie Burke of Mosa, also one sister, Mrs. D. J. McPhail, of Brooke, and two brothers, Duncan and William, of Metcalfe. The funeral service was held at Burns' church, Mosa, on Sunday afternoon.

While driving on the Currie road in Metcalfe township on Sunday evening, ex-Warden John Currie's car was completely wrecked by fire. A short circuit caused a blaze which Mr. Currie extinguished without much trouble, but while doing so the car ran off the road a short distance and tilted slightly. While engaged in repairing some damage caused by the fire a gentleman in a passing automobile volunteered assistance, and lighted a match to look for something in the grass that was lost, when the whole thing went up, vapor from the escaping gasoline causing an explosion.

Rates for Telephone Service

Our rates for exchange service, fixed many years ago, developed many inequalities as between cities at one time equal in population.

In the new schedule filed with the Board of Railway Commissioners we have so grouped cities and towns of approximately equal telephone development as to wipe out these inequalities.

The rates for exchange service proposed for WATFORD under the new schedule are shown in the following table.

Business Service	Proposed Monthly Rate
Individual line	\$2.75
2-Party line	2.25
Residence Service	
Individual line	\$2.00
2-Party line	1.75
Rural party service	1.75

These new rates, we submit, should be considered in the light of the present purchasing power of the dollar. They compare favorably with the increased rates which telephone companies have had to secure from public service bodies all over the continent.
