Instead of beginning at the scalp the first combing should start at the end of the hair. In other words, comb upwards to avoid tangling, breaking and tearing the hair out. This racking of the hair will remove considerable dust. The scalp should be cleaned in spots and sections, and a fine tooth comb is indispensable. It is necessary to draw the comb down through the hair. Dandruff can be removed by combing the surface where it has accumulated, and by slanting the fine comb it may be brought from the scalp without having to go the whole length of the hair. As I said before, the head should be cleaned in spots. When the dead skin has been loosened, a thorough brushing is all that is required to remove it. PEACH JELLY.—Crack a handful of peach seeds, and take out the kernels and put in a preserving kettle with the peeled peaches, add a very little water, and set on the fire to boil. When soft, strain, measure and return to the kettle to cook slowly; allow a pound of sugar to a pint of juice, put in a pan to heat, add to the juice, which should boil twenty minutes; stir until the sugar dissolves, and take up.

FRUIT GINGERBREAD.—One cupful of molasses, one-half cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of water, one teaspoonful of soda dissolved in the water, one egg, one teaspoonful of ginger, two and one-half cupfuls of flour, a pinch of salt.
