Feeling before Faith.

With God there is "no variableness, neither shadow of turning." His requirements cannot be varied or set aside, however sincere or devoted the inquirer. These individuals have, doubtless, again and again, brought their all to the altar, but, in so doing, they have not firmly believed that God would be true, and, at the moment they presented, accept the offering at their hands. They well know it to be the sacrifice that he requires: Rom. xii. 1. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that we present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is vour reasonable service." And that they could not even have brought the offering without his assistance: John xv, 5, "For without me ye can do nothing." But they hesitate to believe, because they do not feel that he has accepted, before they have dared to venture upon the veracity of his word. He has required the sacrifice, and has positively affirmed that he will accept: 2 Cor. vi. 17. "Wherefore, come out from among them, and be ve separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing, and I will receive you." He has given the ability to bring it to the foot of the cross, and yet they will not believe that he does receive, merely because some state of feeling, which has been pictured to the mind, does not immediately follow.
