He has lived and worked nine years amongst that quaintest and oldest of living races, and has observed with a keen eye, and here writes what he has seen with a sharp-pointed pen. The book does for the Koreans what Smith's "Chinese Characteristics " does for the Chinese. All classes, from the coolie to the king, are evidently set forth as they are. There is no varnish; not a little sharpness, but always the sincere sympathy of one who scans closely that he may be prepared the more wisely to help.

FRIENDSHIP. By Rev. Hugh Black, with introductory note by Dr. Robertson Nicoll, and marginal and other decorations by F. Berkeley Smith (\$1.25). "The most popular preacher in Scotland," NO Dr. Nicoll, who is a good authority, says of Mr. Black, "has published a wise and charming little book on "Friendship." A more delightful Christmas gift it would be hard to find.
