TORONTO MARKETS.

Toronto, May 11.

The deliveries of grain this morning were very light. Fall wheat selling at 85 to 95c per bushel for moderate to good qualities.—Spring wheat sold readily at 80 to 88c for moderate to prime. Rye nominal at 1c per lb. Barley very dull at 60 to 70c per bush. for moderate and good qualities. Peas draw from 52 to 56c per bushel. Oats scarce but in active request at 55 to 60c per bushel.—Tares in limited supply, selling at 80 to 112c per bushels. Potatoes in large supply, and are offered by the dealers at 60 to 65c retail, and at 50 to 55c per bushel wholesale. Apples sell freely at 100 to 150c per barrel.—Fresh butter in light supply, selling at 16 to 20c per lb. retail. Eggs draw 8 to 13c per dozen. Poultry—none offering. Hay sells readily at \$20 to \$25 per ton for good qualities. Straw at \$11 per ton. Hides \$4.50 per cwt. Calfskins 8 to 9c per lb. Sheepskins sell at \$1.50 to \$2.00 each. Flour more active; superfine \$3.90 to \$4.00; extra \$4.30.

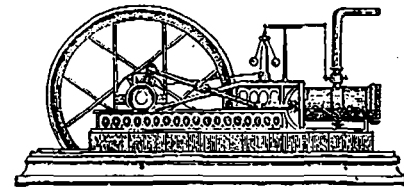
