The amounts of the small-pox claim which the city is endeavoring to procure from the Dominion government is \$13,399.20.

MR. ARTHUR GREEN, of the Union bank returned from a month's change of work at Neepawa. He reports threshing as being briskly pursued in that district at present, and crops excellent.

W. J. BAWLF (late of Port Arthur) has opened out in the flour, feed and wood business in the place lately occupied as the Globe hotel, next to the Grain Exchange Princess Street.

SUNDAY afternoon C. P. R. whistles alarmed the employees and the rising of volumes of smoke indicated a fire prevailing in the yard. By some means yet unknown, the sand shed was ignited and nearly consumed before the flames were subdued.

The total average number of patients treated in the Winnipeg General hospital for the week ending Saturday, the 4th inst., was ninety-two, of which fifty-three were males and thirty-nine females. Seventeen outpatients were also treated during the week.

The health office reports the following contagious diseases for the week ending Friday evening: Typhoid fever 39; diphtheria 4; measles, 1; small-pox, 1; total 45. Typhoid fever is on the increase, due in most cases, Dr. Inglis says, to drinking well water.

The photographic car of the C. P. R. was attached to the express from the west which arrived at 1.15 p. m. Sunday. Mr. Henderson, who is in charge of the apparatus, has been spending the summer and fall in the Rockies and Selkirk, taking views along the line for development and printing this winter.

SINNOTT, who was charged with stealing a \$5 bill, the property of Magistrate Mulvey, has been released as the Chief Justice has quashed the conviction. Sinnott has commenced actions for damages against Mr. Mulvey and Mr. Wolf, who sentenced him. Mr. Kennedy, Q.C., appeared for the magistrates.

At a meeting of the shoe clerks of the city held on Monday night steps were taken to see that the enforcing of the early closing by law was strictly adhered to, as it was rumored that some of the merchants were contravening the law. A committee was appointed to report any irregularity.

On Monday evening about half-past 10 o'clock fire was discovered in the residence of Dr. Dalgleish, on Balmoral street. An alarm was sent in and the brigade responded promptly. The flames had made considerable progress by the time the firemen arrived, and were quickly subdued by a deluge of chemicals and water. The furniture suffered most, and the damage will amount to several hundred dollars. It is thought that the fire was caused by a small heating stove standing between the dining room and parlor. The family was absent when the fire occurred.

On Saturday afternoon the C. P. R. company's steamer Alberta arrived in port with thirty passengers bound for different points east, seventy-four cars of merchandise, etc., were also on board. From Sunday evening until yesterday noon sixty-five men were engaged in loading her for the return trip to Fort William. One car each of nails, apples, ale, tobacco, and two cars of whiskey were loaded, besides twenty-eight cars which came in on Monday morning, consisting of machinery and merchandise of every description, bound for the N. W. T. She left yesterday afternoon at one o'clock, carrying some passengers also.—Owen Sound Advertiser.

JAMES COTTER, lithographic pressman of the Free Press, died Saturday morning at 4.30 at his home on King Street, of typhoid fever. He was only ill about two weeks. He has been a resident of the city for the past ten years, coming here from Montreal, and was a faithful workman. He leaves a wife and four children. Mr. Cotter's father arrived in the city on Saturday. The funeral took place from his late residence, on King street, to St. Mary's church, at 3.30 Tuesday morning. There was a good attendance of friends of the deceased. The Rev. Father McCarthy celebrated requiem mass at St. Mary's church, and Father O'Dwyer conducted the service at the grave. The pall-bearers were F. Bird, G. Gladden, H. Brown, W. Colleton, F. Morton and A. Irvine. The funeral arrangements were in charge of M. Hughes & Son.

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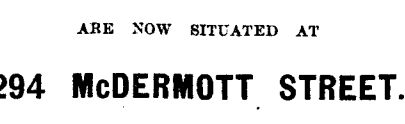
