I ask him the direct question; after one week's trial period of this system of planned attendance does he feel it is working in the way it was intended, and would he explain some of the advantages to the house which he outlined on October 4?

Mr. Trudeau: I must say that the Conservative party is even more conservative than we thought. We hope they will keep trying this novelty.

Mr. G. W. Baldwin (Peace River): I should like to ask the Prime Minister if he can give assurance to the house that no crisis will arise within a department on days when that department is not represented by a minister.

Mr. Trudeau: Yes, Mr. Speaker, provided they are not engineered by the opposition.
